Royal Spoonbill

(Platalea regia)

When I was a lad, and I reiterate, it wasn't that long ago, this bird fascinated me. For those who haven't seen one, it is has got just that, a bill in the shape of a spoon. With wide sweeping scythe like movements through shallow muddy wetlands it searches for yabbies and other invertebrates with its super sensitive bill. Like most birds though, unless you go to the right places to look, you'll never see one. Our local wetland over on Eastlink called Rigby's is normally a very reliable spot to see them, but sometimes they just aren't there.

In flight they can easily be mistaken for Ibis, I certainly have to do a doubletake each time I see Ibis flying overhead. I know, I know, I say it every time, but they are a stunning looking bird. Take a look at Kim's photo of one, what a photo. We are absolutely blessed to have these photos from Kim each month. Visit her website Lirra Lirra to view her stunning photography. She is recognised all over the world for her photography, not hard to see why when you look at photos like this.

We have two species of Spoonbill in Australia (both moderately common in Victoria), the Royal and the Yellow-billed Spoonbill, with both species intermingling in some situations. The Yellow-billed often has an amount of muddy discolouration on his plumage, in stark contrast to the Royal who is always immaculately clean with plumage as white as the driven snow.

I have just recently finished a job on a new bridge over Altona creek in Altona Meadows and, for some reason that I can't explain, several species of wader would sometimes come very close to the bridge while feeding, seemingly oblivious to the men working right near them. I got as close to a Great Egret, Intermediate Egret and Blackwinged Stilt that I would ever have dreamt possible, and couldn't believe my eyes when I lifted my welding helmet to find five Royal Spoonbill feeding about 10 metres from me. You'd take that any day of the week you could get it. And yet the men working all around me were even more oblivious, they didn't notice the birds at all. Huh, go figure. That is except for my mate Dave who claims a Toucan flew over while I was welding. And then an hour later reckons a Pteradactyl soared overhead but by the time he sung out to me it was gone. I have to put up with a lot on these job sites, honest I do. Especially from Dave.

I don't want to open a can of worms or in any way offend people of faith who believe humans and perhaps all animals didn't evolve but were created, but how, or maybe who, could have dreamed up this bird's bill. I personally believe in evolution, and believe evolution in no way discounts the possibility of a higher being. But whoever or however this bird's bill was designed, it's pretty well out there, isn't it?

And on the subject of bills, every single species of bird has a bill which is highly specialised for the efficient consumption of food to give them the energy to continue. Go on, say it, no kidding, of course that's just elementary, but think about it. A bird of prey's bill, ideal for tearing apart meat. A Cockatoo or Parrot's bill for cracking hard seeds or tearing timber apart in search of grubs. Finches' beaks for finding and picking up tiny seeds.

The list goes on, you'll all be bored to tears if I continue: you get it.

Our field trips have started up again if any newcomers out there are thinking


of joining us. On a personal level, I just love meeting all the people who have come along on our field trips,

Beat Up or Blunder?

It has never been my practice to argue local government conflicts in this paper, but when untenable accusations of incompetence and bias form the base of an election opponent's campaign against me then I claim the same right of reply as any aggrieved victim.

This concerns a planning permit on the historic Ferndale site in The Basin and some of the most basic principles of town planning and mutual respect.

Every piece of land has a planning scheme which may contain zones and overlays to protect land owners and the neighbourhood, allowing certain activities and structures while restricting others. When you buy a piece of property you are also buying, the right to do things that comply with the planning scheme. I do not believe that any home-owner or ratepayer should be arbitrarily stripped of their property rights without very good reason. We rely on respect for the planning scheme to protect our environment, both built and natural, from inappropriate development and environmental damage. We can't just pick and choose which part of the planning scheme to comply with.

In the case of Ferndale, the historic site is subject to the restrictions and permissions of a Rural Conservation Zone that includes designated permission to operate a restaurant on the site.

The first I heard of the application for a planning permit was in a very brief side conversation with the main objector at the annual Knox Sport and Recreation Awards on June 6th, 2019. The impression I got from the description of what was planned was something like an all-night licensed King Street nightclub on the edge of the National Park. My response was to the effect that "there's no way that would get up". Remember, this was a very brief conversation in a crowded room with no notes. Although my mental image of the permit application was unclear, it was very much in keeping with descriptions in many later emails. It was an example of the argument by exaggeration that was to dominate the debate. What the owners actually proposed was a small, high-class Japanese restaurant entirely within an existing building, tucked into the heavily treed slope

amongst the trees, not visible from the surrounding roads and operating normal restricted restaurant times. It could hardly be more discrete. However, in all the statements of opponents, 'small' and 'discrete' are missing terms.

At a personal level, this was just six days before my wife was diagnosed with motor neurone disease and my attention was consequently disrupted for some time. Nonetheless, I fulfilled all my Councillor duties and more. Meanwhile, the objector corresponded with the Mayor of that time, Cr Jake Keogh, who gave him written advice on the available planning appeal options. Worth noting is that it is not necessary that objectors live in the vicinity of the subject property. Any Knox resident with an interest in the application or objections could lodge an objection themselves. I am told Ms Dwight did not lodge an objection although she was eligible to do so.

I twice visited the subject site to seek any compelling reason for stripping the owners of the property of their zoning permission -- and found none. Much has been made by Ms Dwight of my visit to the site and the fact that I knew the site manager personally as if there was something sinister in this. The manager is a Fire Brigade colleague and a person of impeccable good character and honesty. Worth noting is that at least one of the VCAT commissioners also subsequently visited the site for the same reason and with the same outcome as me.

Amongst the things I have been repeatedly accused of are not 'calling in' the planning application rather than allowing an officer to make the judgement under delegation.. The truth is that because there were insufficient objections I was not notified of the application and when I said that no-one had asked me I was treated with contempt. The untruthful exaggerations continue into the present.


The main objector has some grounds for disliking the proposed restaurant, particularly increased street traffic, but neither the Coucil nor VCAT believed it was sufficient grounds for refusing the permit. We would all like less traffic in our street.

I understand people wanting to put their case as forcibly as they can, but that does not justify deliberate exaggeration to knowingly distort the truth. This case has been beset with untruthful exaggeration from the outset and denials can't change that, nor refusing to look at or consider the evidence of which there is plenty.

Truth should not be optional.

Major revitalisation boost for Boronia

Boronia is one of six town centres in metropolitan Melbourne to receive a revitalisation boost as part of the Victorian Government's Suburban Revitalisation Program.

As part of the Building Works Stimulus Package, the Program is funding shovel-ready projects in Boronia, Melton, Noble Park, Reservoir, Lilvdale and Tarneit.

Each site will receive \$500,000 from the state government for local infrastructure projects to improve public space and amenity while supporting local jobs and stimulating local business and community activity. This investment will play an important role in Boronia's coronavirus (COVID-19) recovery

"We all know Boronia is in need of a bit of love – it's the biggest shopping precinct out our way, next to Eastland and Knox Westfield. We all want to see it live up to the potential we know it has," said member for Bayswater Jackson Taylor. "To kick-start the revitalisation of the Boronia Town Centre, the State Government is investing \$250,000 with a co-contribution from Knox City Council of \$370,000 for a major revitalisation of Lupton Way, in Boronia, '



In the aftermath the scale of the damage is almost overwhelming. We have half a very big tree on our roof and a swathe of destruction through my treasured rainforest. Some will grow back, others are gone and, for the first time in a decade, we can see our neighbours' back porch.

But our damage is light compared to some, such as the Fern Street, The Basin house on our front cover. Fortunately there was no-one home when the storm threw a couple of huge old pine trees through the house, followed by some smaller trees to complete the damage.

Now the ravine resounds to chainsaws and wood chippers, still clearing the mess a month on... or taking out suspect trees before the next storm comes. Our world is warming and most weather, hot or cold, is driven by heat



Backing In Grassroots Cricket Locally

Our local grassroots crickets will soon be enjoying better facilities at Miller Park Reserve, with the announcement of funding through the Community Cricket Program – Community Facilities stream.

STPFIDA 2020

Local Member for Bayswater, Jackson Taylor, nnounced \$89,000 in funding to upgrade facilities at Miller Park.

The ground is the home of the Knox Boronia Churches Cricket Club – the Burras – and the funding will see the demolition of the old and unsafe nets and the construction of a new outdoor enclosed three bay cricket net training facility, bringing the facilities into the 21st century.

The project is one of 15 across the state to share in \$1.4 million from the fund.

With over 235,000 registered cricket participants across the state for 2019-2020, Victoria is the national home of cricket. That number is expected to rise this summer thanks to Australia's inspirational win at the recent 2020 ICC Women's T20 World Cup Final at the home of cricket the MCG.

That's why the Andrews Government is getting on with modernising cricket facilities so clubs like the Burras and communities can cater for even more Victorians, particularly women and girls keen to get involved in cricket.



Local news – Deal signed to provide COVID vaccine early next year

Living in Victoria, we really need some hope right now.

The Victorian restrictions have been devastating and the path out looks like it will be long and protracted. One of our best chances of getting back to normal is if a vaccine for the virus is found and made accessible.

Recently we have been making some great progress.

Last month we secured a \$1.7 billion deal for the supply and production of both the Oxford University vaccine and the University of Queensland vaccine, should their trials prove successful.

These vaccines are some of the most developed in the world and are both very promising candidates.

As a federal government we have been focused on getting agreements in place so that if and when a vaccine becomes available, we can quickly produce it and make it accessible to every Australian for free. Ultimately, this will save lives, protect lives,

and allow Australians to return to their lives.

The Oxford University vaccine is the most progressed in its development and is currently in the final phase of development. It shows strong antibody responses, strong T-cell responses and outstanding safety outcomes with the Phase 3 clinical trial seeing it tested on 50,000 people across the globe.



Although the development has been accelerated, safety has remained the top priority. The Oxford trial were recently paused due to a possible adverse effect in one patient, but after the case was independently assessed it was deemed that trials could safely continue. This is a clear demonstration that safety remains the most important consideration in the development of this vaccine. We will never produce a vaccine that is unsafe.

If the Oxford vaccine successfully passes these trials and is approved by the governing bodies, it could be available as early as January next year.

The Queensland University vaccine is not as progressed and is currently in Phase 1 of human trials but is still a very promising candidate.

Having agreements for both these vaccines means that we have a greater chance of having a safe vaccine that we can produce. We will continue to sign deals when promising candidates are found to increase this chance.

We expect that a vaccine will be initially provided to healthcare workers and the vulnerable, then the rest of Australia. The PM has made it clear that vaccines cannot be made compulsory, but we do expect most Australians to jump on the opportunity to

protect themselves against this virus and return to their normal lives.

There is still a chance that a successful vaccine may not be developed, but at the same time I am carefully optimistic that we will have one next year.

It is a bit of hope in what has been a very distressing year for Victorians.



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Not for profit organisation, Evie Grace Foundation, has announced its partnership with social enterprise, Ecopads Australia. The team is on a mission to end period poverty in East Africa.

Period poverty is a global issue. It affects up to 500 million women and girls a month, leaving them without basic access to sanitary pads. Evie Grace and Ecopads will assist some of the 65% of women and girls in Kenya facing this plight, by providing them with affordable, reusable cloth pads. The need is urgent. Tragically girls as young as 13 are forced to offer sex in exchange for

clean pads, increasing HIV risks, and the threat of rape. Community taboos about menstruation, and extreme poverty additionally worsen risks of infection, where dirty scraps of toilet paper, and even cardboard, are the only alternative to pads.

Evie Grace Foundation and Ecopads Australia were both founded by young Australian women, and their shared commitment to sustainability, and human rights will create a unique endeavor.

Maddi Kent founded Evie Grace Foundation in 2018, and she has provided menstrual hygiene packs and education to thousands

of girls in East Africa. Committed to eliminating child exploitation through community empowerment and education programs, Evie Grace Foundation also advocates for street children and rescues them from the devastation of starvation, rape, and kidnapping. They have successfully fundraised \$83,000 to purchase land for a rescue and rehabilitation home for street boys and are starting to fundraise for a Therapeutic Home for Girls in Malawi.

Freeda Thong, founder of Ecopads Australia, began sewing cloth pads in late 2015. This led to research on

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cloth pad usage and she discovered pressing issues of menstruation taboos and poverty around the world. Fast forward five years and Freeda has distributed more than 20,000 reusable pads to people, not only in Australia but all over the world through Ecopads 'one-for-one' initiative.

"20 billion pads and tampons end up in landfill every year and that's just in Australia. Knowing these take 500-800 years to break down, we need to do better and make the switch to reusables".

Maddi is optimistic about the new partnership with Freeda and Ecopads.

"Without Ecopads' assistance, more women and girls will continue suffering and even dying in their communities. But now, together, we can save lives. As a team, we'll provide education and resources to fight period poverty. As women, we know that periods should merely be annoying. They shouldn't constitute a death threat."

The Knox Regional Netball Centre is set for a transformation, thanks to a \$5 million funding boost from the Victorian Government's *Community Sports Infrastructure Stimulus Program*.

Local Member for Bayswater, Jackson Taylor MP, today announced that the project is one of 27 to benefit from a share in more than \$68 million from the stimulus program.

This investment recognises the overwhelming demand for shovel-ready community sports infrastructure and is part of the Victorian Government's \$2.7 billion *Building Works* package creating jobs and kick-starting vital projects across the state.

The project will involve the redevelopment of the overall site and the construction of an additional two new indoor netball courts to Netball Victoria standards, with





associated facilities and amenities including toilets, two change rooms and storerooms.

Once complete the project will deliver world-standard facilities that local netballers, of all ages, from right around the east will love for years to come.

The facility will provide a perfect base for many local netball clubs, including Fairpark Netball Club, The Basin Netball Club and Boronia Netball Club, to develop programs, train, host games and events.

This investment is about helping grassroots sports communities get back in the game when the time is right.

From sports field lighting upgrades at multiple sites to new indoor sports courts, investments like these provide high-quality and accessible places for Victorians to reap the benefits of sport and active recreation participation.


By working with local government authorities, alpine resort boards and sporting clubs and organisations, the program is fast-tracking shovel-ready community sports infrastructure projects across Victoria and is expected to create almost \$140 million in local economic activity.

This includes jobs in construction and supply chains with benefits for local businesses through the Victorian Government's Local Jobs First requirements which will be built into contracts.

The program is part of the more than \$915 million in Victorian Government investment in community sport and recreation infrastructure since 2014.

Mr. Taylor acknowledged the Knox Council as well as the Federal Government for their commitment and financial contribution to the project.


