So this was the social and political viewpoint of my 9 year old self when I joined a lot of young primary school children for a bus trip to Red Cliffs where we would get to see our young Queen. I remember holding a small flag, Britain's Union Jack, not the Australian flag. Still, my unquestioning allegiance held.

And then came the Queen and the first breaking of my unquestioning loyalty. The Queen and her immediate entourage travelled in a topless Land Rover, the Queen standing, smiling and waving to her young subjects lined up around the Red Cliff's football ground. She was, I thought, very pretty. Then I spoke aloud the most enduring words that governed my new-found sense of political decency:

"She's not better than my Mum."

And that's been my over-riding political mantra ever since. Governing of the people should be by the people. That means everyone involved in political decision making is either elected to the position or appointed by others who have been elected into their position.

Queen Elizabeth II was a remarkable woman and an ideal head of the Great Britain political entity. But it's time we reviewed our place in a political state headed by an unelected monarch on the opposite side of the world. None of my children, grand-children or great grand-children should be banned by birth from aspiring to the highest office in the country. No Australian child should be so constrained.

# CHANNEL-BILLED CUCKOO

Do these months roll around as quickly for you as they do me? It seems like yesterday I did the Satin Bowerbird, now it's that time again. My editor pushes me hard let me tell you, if the deadline isn't met he threatens to halve my salary, and as a poor starving would be writer, still nothing published, I'll soon have to sing for my supper, and you lot would not like that. Shocking voice!

We did our monthly field trip to a site in Officer recently to nail Latham's Snipe, but got absolutely zero. To quote Billy Connolly "Not a sausage, in an area renowned for it's sausages." It's a bit of a double-edged sword when everything is so wet, these waders have too much habitat to choose from and so disperse to the four winds. We did manage to get a small Copperhead snake basking for a tiny bit of sunshine in the wetland despite it being a freezing cold day. So after a hot Pakenham Upper (cuppa) we decided to twitch the Channel -billed Cuckoo in Berwick on the way home ..... and eventually we nailed him.

One of the girls in our group, Liz, who lives in Berwick was right on the money and took us to his favourite tree that he hangs around in, a big Moreton Bay Fig right on the Princes Highway, between Berwick and Beaconsfield. To cut a very long story short, that was probably the hardest twitch I've ever endured, he was perched nearly at the top, in the thickest foliaged part of the tree and was not moving a muscle, extremely difficult to spot! And at this point I'd like to mention they are a huge bird, 58-66 cm, should have stuck out like a sore toe, uh uh, harder to spot than a happy Collingwood supporter after yesterday's thrilling preliminary final at the SCG.

When we got there four other twitchers were already spread out around the tree with expensive cameras and high -end binoculars, you know the type, do anything to get one more tick on their list, really, I mean, some people, why don't they get a life! We aren't like that... much!

It must have looked like curious goings on to the hundreds of passing cars and their passengers,

what were those dozen or so lunatics looking at that tree for, pointing and head shaking, binoculars glued to their eyeballs with necks craned, rain pouring down

and an arctic wind blowing. It got the better of about half a dozen cars, people stopping all with the same question, "What the hell are you lot looking at?" and on getting their answer most rolled their eyes and gave a "yeah, right" and took off, but some parked their cars and joined in the hunt with us.

This Channel -billed Cuckoo has been returning to Berwick for about the last 10 years or so and is a real rarity in Victoria. Common in coastal NSW and Queensland and to a lesser extent the Top End, they are breeding migrants from Indonesia and Papua New Guinea.

As discussed in previous issues of this column Cuckoo's do not raise their own young, parasitising specific species to do the job for them. The Channel-billed Cuckoo targets Pied Currawong, Australian Magpie and Torresian Crow, among others. Interestingly Liz has witnessed this bird being harassed by both Magpies and Pied Currawongs, proof that the hosts are aware of the intent of these birds, but once the eggs have been laid in the hosts nest, they normally raise them as their own.

Channel-billed Cuckoos are the only species of cuckoo in Australia who don't toss out of the nest the eggs or young of the host species, all others do. Their chicks always manage to get the lions share of the tucker brought in by the parents though, nearly always resulting in the hosts chicks dying of starvation.

And on another interesting twist, many 'reclaimed' juveniles associate with adults. I have actually witnessed this myself, a juvenile Horsefield's Cuckoo with an adult bird. So it appears that the host raises the young but then may reunite with its parents, rather odd, but hey, if it works.

Well there you have it, an insight into the crazy world of a twitcher, not me of course, I'm a refined and cultured puritan, I'm a birdwatcher. Did someone say they saw a Painted Snipe over in South Australia? See ya later guys, I'm outta here. Till next month,

# IT FEELS GREAT TO PLANT TREES WITH OTHERS!

Why was I planting trees with others, you ask? Well, let me tell you. On the morning of Sunday 28 August, around 40 – 50 people came together to plant trees near Wattletree Road in Boronia/Ferntree Gully.

The event was organised by the Biodiversity team at Knox City Council along with the Friends of the Blind Creek Billabong. It was a raging success! The weather was simply perfect for tree planting. A lovely 'top of 20' with a slight breeze made it very enjoyable.

People of all ages came around including little 3 and-4 year-olds with their parents. While planting trees, the kids had fun looking at the worms that were dug out of the earth. Some carefully put the worms back into the earth and were on the lookout for more.



Overall, around 1200 shrubs/trees/plants were planted, which is quite impressive. As the French president famously said, "There is no planet B". Indeed, we need to take care of our planet. We cannot treat the planet like trash and expect the human race to thrive.

Humans have an unwritten contract of coexistence with the environment. If we bring it down, we will go down with it. This is why such community events as these are super important. And many people coming around to give a hand shows that they feel similarly about it and are happy to contribute to take care of our environment. Diane sent me the following paragraph about their group. "We meet on the 4th Saturday of the month at 10 am to 12pm, at Chatham Reserve (near the foot bridge), Ferntree Gully. BYO gloves. We are a friendly group and welcome new volunteers with open arms. We work on rehabilitating Blind Creek and we have many different jobs to choose from when we meet. Weeding, planting, rubbish collection, thinning mulch, etc. Other things pop up too. We always have a chat at the end and feel free to bring morning tea to share if you feel like it. FROGY's plan is to restore upper Blind Creek by weeding, laying mulch, removing rubbish and planting out species native to the local area. Most importantly, meeting new friends along the way and getting a good workout.

•Dandenong Creek between JW Manson Reserve and Bayswater Park






- •Boronia Road between Langwith Avenue and Boronia Mall



Tucked away in a quiet street near the Ferntree Gully station, is a small unassuming building called "The Hut" which has been the home of the Ferntree Gully Arts society for the last 75 years.

Inside the foyer I was greeted by Debbie, who I had arranged to meet to find out more about the gallery and its community. Debbie began telling me how she had attended one of the Art workshops on oil painting, which she had never done before and had received lots of help from two members with " 120 years experience between them." "I've only been a member for three months" she said "and now I'm on the committee, helping with media. I'm enjoying being involved so much."

The volunteers who run the hut are passionate about all types of art and getting people involved. On weekdays they run workshop sessions which are not tutored, but there are always experienced people willing to help you get started and share some of their knowledge. For only \$5 for members or \$10 for nonmembers you can attend a range of art topics as well as painting, print, still life, and polymer clay. Life drawing sessions run by Glenda, attract a small fee to cover the cost of the model which changes every week. I was particularly taken by two life drawings displayed in the fover by Glenda, who had truly captured the elegance and beauty of the young woman.

As well as the workshops there are art classes for

primary kids and for teens. These are tutored classes and fees apply. These programs encourage children to develop their love of art and nurture their talent. Shirley Dougan who tutors the Teens class said that it is a pleasure to tutor students who are so keen to learn. One of her students now has an Instagram page through which she has sold a lot of artwork. Others have gone on to win arts prizes.

On weekends, every month there is a new exhibition of works in the spacious gallery which are arranged so that you could easily view the artworks from the centre of room. From the side of the gallery is a door which leads through to the beautiful sculpture garden, opened in 2019.

This year will see the inaugural award for Sculpture.

In October, the annual members' exhibition is held in which members bring out their best artworks to be in the running for the prizes and awards. The October exhibition showcases the standard available to you in The Hut Workshops. October is also seniors' month where seniors can try the workshops for free. It's a wonderful welcoming place to visit.

This year commemorates the 80th year of the Boronia urban Fire Brigade.

In 1942 the war came to Australia. The government of the day saw in its wisdom to establish some protection for the outer suburbs of Melbourne.

In July 1942 a public meeting was held in the Boronia progress hall. Volunteers were called for and a fire brigade was formed, with a fire station built in Ringwood Road, now Dorset Road, near the Commonwealth Bank. A fire truck was supplied.

Bayswater was made an out station but no truck, just a hand reel and hose.

Laurie Maguires garage was the air raid wardens office, with a siren mounted on his garage.

A number of restrictions were implemented. Street lighting was dimmed or turned off and all houses had to close their curtains at night. Residents built their own air raid shelters on their own property.

Name signs on all railway stations were removed for security reasons. Ration cards were issued for food and petrol. Some people converted their cars to run on charcoal gas. Exercises were conducted to deal with incendiary bombs. Vehicles had black out lights fitted

By 1957 Boronia township was growing and a new station was built in Boronia Road. where the bowling alley is now. In 1972 permanent staff came; they worked alongside the volunteers. In 1976 the station was extended to 4 bays. In 1998 a third station was built in Boronia Road, just west of Scoresby Road.

Just recently the brigade reverted back to a fully volunteer brigade. We are co-tenants with the FRV Fire Rescue Victoria.

## **NEW FIRE DANGER RATING SYSTEM**

A new and simplified national Fire Danger Rating system is now being rolled out.

The new system will be used across Australia to provide the community with clearer, and more consistent information.

Whether you are at home, or travelling interstate, you will see the same system being used.

This change is necessary because each state used different signs, and it created confusion on what actions people needed to take.

Instead of having 6 fire danger rating levels, the new system will have 4 levels: moderate, high, extreme and catastrophic.

Each level will have a clear set of actions for people to protect themselves, their family and property.

Road signs are being updated to the new system.

One thing about early/partial retirement is that I get to do a lot more things that I planned to do but somehow never got around to. One of those things is going into the city and catching the many exhibitions that Melbourne is famous for. However, the idea of traveling in for night sessions or the busy weekends always seemed like a good deterrent. So, now with the onset of more leisure time the wife and I have found the joy of mid-week visits when the crowds are sparse and the enjoyment ramps up to high because you take

from his early days working in a gallery to his relocation to Paris, his relationship with other famous artists and his time in an asylum as his slim grasp on sanity eroded as his mental health declined. Meanwhile, through all of this, he kept up a staggering productivity of artwork. There was even a physical replica of one of his famous paintings The Bedroom at Arles a painting of his residence at the Asylum he had admitted himself to. This was fun because you could take photos of yourself sitting in a painting. This part was


more time to inspect, savor and immerse yourself in the experience. I know that may sound over the top but I found myself really getting into these shows like never before.

One that I found particularly fascinating was the Vincent Van Gogh exhibit at the LUME. If you aren't aware of the LUME, it's a very large art space attached to the end of the Melbourne Convention Centre (Jeff's Shed) in South Wharf. It uses technology to seamlessly project and animate artworks on large surfaces (including the floor) to display and tell the story of a featured artist. Accompanied by classical music, usually taken from the same period as the artist, you get a totally immersive experience from wherever you sit stand or wander in a room that is as large as a football

I'm explaining all this now, but when we visited one Thursday morning we had no idea what to expect as the website really doesn't do it justice. When we first arrived we entered a hall that had many placards that told the story of Van Gogh, important because it helped you understand a little more of what we were about to experience.

We then walked down a short corridor that opened into the grand theatre that is the LUME.

It's hard to explain the overall effect it had on me. Colour was an important feature of his work, and so were landscapes. Some of these were subtly animated so that trees and wheat fields swayed in the wind, trains ran through towns and at one point rain fell and caused puddles on the floor. All the time, quotes from Van Gogh taken from his many letters to his brother helped show his moods and emotions of the time. One of the most emotional features was the showing of the last canvas Van Gogh painted Wheatfield with Crows just before he attempted to take his own life in the very same scene. He died two days later from the wounds. The visuals of three crows flying off to the sound of a single gunshot were enough to take your breath away. Sadly, the Van Gogh exhibit has run its course and a new attraction featuring Claude Monet is to take its place, which I have no



doubt will be just as stunning. If I take one lasting memory away from the feature that I could call a highlight it would be the total area of the massive warehouse-like space covered in the painting Starry Night over the Rhone. Bathing everything in blue with the yellow stars rotating in the sky like little vellow fireworks. To one side a large board showing the quote "I don't know anything with certainty, but seeing the stars makes me dream."

Vincent liked to paint his dreams.

Rob is a musician, songwriter, author and former music teacher who has lived in Boronia since 1978. He taught at Mountain Gate Primary School, was a regular performer at Paddy's Tavern in Ferntree Gully and played at the inaugural Basin Music Festival. In a performing career spanning five decades he has played at major festivals in Port Fairy and Tamworth and has stood on stages at the Melbourne Concert Hall and The Sydney Opera House. His music has also taken him to places as far flung as Ireland, The United Kingdom, Russia, Japan, Sri Lanka and Mozambique. He retired from regular performance in 2019 but still 'keeps his hand in' by helping to run a music group for Croydon U3A and writing and recording birthday songs for his three grand daughters. ## Can babies sing?

A friend of mine, who is a musician, began singing a few notes to my 8-month-old grandson and it seemed like he was imitating the same notes back to her. At this age babies are already starting to imitate speech sounds and I wondered if it was possible that babies could imitate musical sounds.

Babies learn music babble just as they learn babble talk. They experiment with basic music properties like volume, tone, and pitch, just as they do with different languages. Studies have shown that babies as young as 3 to 6 months have the ability to imitate pitched tones. By 12 months they can spontaneously sing short phrases with different pitches, and by 12 to 15 months they start to imitate the changes in melody. Play sessions with music has been shown to improve babies' brain processing of both music and new speech sounds.

Singing is the best way you can bring music into your child's life. Your voice is an ideal and convenient instrument and they have heard it from the time they were in the womb. They can respond with their own vocal sounds and you can encourage them to sing by example. Here are a few tips I found on singing to your child. (you don't need to be a great singer!)

Sing Without Words - When you sing to your child, sing songs without words or lyrics. You can sing songs you already know, just sing the melody and replace the words with a repeated vocal syllable (like 'la la la la').

When you sing and remove the words you encourage your child to focus on the music instead of the song's language.

Interact and Imitate - You can encourage your child to sing and interact with you musically, even at a very early age, by imitating their natural vocal sounds, adding short bits of singing, and pausing to let them respond, engaging them in 'call and response' singing.







## WATCH OUT FOR THE "Hi Mum" SCAM

Scammers are pretending to be children in need of financial help as part of a new messaging scam targeting parents, authorities have warned.

At least 25 victims of the scam, which originated in Europe, have been detected in Victoria this year.

The victims typically receive a WhatsApp or text message from an unknown number

impersonating their child.

According to police, messages say something along the lines of "Hi mum, I've changed provider/lost/broken my phone – I'm temporarily using this number for now."

The offenders eventually request money from the victim, usually using some kind of emergency as their justification for needing the

Most of the offenders are based overseas and are not known to the victims.

Detective Sergeant John Cheyne from the

Cybercrime Squad said such scams pulled on the victim's heartstrings.

**ALERT** "A child telling you they've lost or broken their phone and are in need of financial support is understandably a situation where parents would react without a second thought," he said in a statement.

SCAM

"If ever you receive a message from an unknown number asking for money, it's always worth asking for some kind of verification.

"If they can't prove who they are or aren't willing to, don't transfer the money.'


