

Folk Festival. Somebody should start a music festival in The Basin. Eventually the obvious next step was to acknowledge that each of us was somebody and that, indeed, 'somebody' should start a music festival in the Basin.

Next step was promoting the proposed festival in the Boronia & The Basin Community News, which proved to be a very dynamic tool for generating strong community interest and support. This was followed by the generation of paperwork – Association registration, Council support, insurance, agendas, minutes, records... etc. My dislike of paperwork and bureaucracy in general proved no barrier to getting us incorporated and legitimate.

Support came from all directions, we even had Keith Potger from The Seekers as our official sponsor and the very community minded Bendigo Bank's generosity along with a Council grant to get the show rolling. Most thanks are deserved by the official and unofficial committee members and the many professional and aspiring musicians.

From the outset it was the concept of promoting local musicians and the community that drove the direction of the festival although many alternative themes have been considered, some adopted, some in the festival's future.

Highlights in the evolution of the event include Cameron's Transport who donated the weekend use of a semi-trailer as a stage; removal of the house block that cut the Triangle park in half; construction of a new, still popular playground with conveniently placed toilet block, against a Council Officers's strong opposition; construction of the Pavilion as a great outdoor music stage; refurbishment and modification of the Progress Hall and remodelling of the Triangle.


For our first concert post-Covid, there's a weeking of diverse music planned, including more youthoriented music.

The Emu is on our coat of arms, unless you were raised by an Innuit tribe inside the Arctic circle or visiting from another galaxy, you know what they look like. No need to describe them. If you do need areminder check out Garry's fantastic photo. Our largest native bird, they are flightless but can reach a top speed of 50km/h for short bursts. Surprisingly they are excellent swimmers. They are omnivores like us, their diet includes seeds, bulbs, grass, flowers as well as large insects, small reptiles and birds.

In 2016 we did a trip to the Flinders Ranges north of Hawker in South Australia, beautiful spot on the edge of the outback. It had been an excellent year rainfall wise, lush plant life and hopping with birds and mammals. Emu Dads had broods of chicks everywhere (the male chaperones the chicks for 18 months, Mums nowhere to be seen) with most having about 10 – 12 chicks in tow, really cute with the dark stripes on their body. However not far from Wilpena Pound Adrienne and I witnessed a rather unusual scene, one Old Man Emu had 38 chicks in tow! On our return I did some research on this with two possible scenarios.

1. The male was minding several broods of chicks

and was giving some Dads a bit of time out. Sort of like a creche or day care for Emu chicks.

2. This is the most probable of the two, several females had laid their eggs in the one nest and hence Dad getting a quadruple amount of chicks to mind. Luckily the chicks are self- sufficient and more or less look after themselves once hatched. Would still be pretty stressful though.

And on the subject of Dads, my Father often went up to Hattah Lakes between Ouyen and Mildura, camping at Lake Hattahcampground. He loved walking around checking out the massive River Redgums, there are some huge examples of this beautiful eucalypt up there as well as the birds, snakes or lizards or anything else of interest. Anyhow, said father has a penchant for a mid afternoon nap, and has been known to take said nap wherever that time of the day catches him. This particular day a shady spot under a big River Redgum became prime real estate for catching some zzzz's and he just lay down on the ground and fell fast asleep. That was until an Emu, curious as to this prone human making some rather unusual noises, he snores like there's no tomorrow, started making some curious noises himself in said father's earhole. On waking up an Emu was about an inch from his face, wish I had that on video!

A very disturbing aspect for me of my Fathers ramblings in this dry landscape was his very common viewings of Malleefowl. I would have been there at least half a dozen times with him but I never saw one once. Still not on my lifelist, this is possibly a little too distressing for me to write about any longer. However, we are going to a place in South Australia soon the other side of Port Augusta and they are supposed to be a monty. If I dip out, again, well let's not talk about it.

And on the subject of Port Augusta, it would surprise many to learn that a feral population of Ostrich (they were introduced in 1869) persists to this day at a place just north of this humble township. I'd love to twitch one, but I think it's extremely difficult. Never know your luck. If you're wondering if that's a legitimate tick on your list, as a matter of fact it is. Hey, I got Indian Peafowl (Peacock) for my life list on French Island where a feral population exists. Gotta take what's on offer.

As a younger man I spent a couple of years working on a cattle station in Northern South Australia with mostly Aboriginal men, and they were particularly jumpy about the Kurdaitcha man, a mystical man who was known to avenge



the death of tribal members at the hands of other members of the tribe. The Kurdaitcha man wore emu feather's around his feet so he didn't leave any tracks. I spent many a night sitting around a campfire with the wind put up me after listening to some of their stories!

Hey how good is it having Paul Woods on board in our newspaper now? Quirky, thought provoking and downright hilarious I reckon, welcome Paul. A very pleasing addition to round out a great paper with lots of interesting articles. I would also like to welcome Sevvandi, I very much enjoyed the article about tree planting, well done!

As mentioned at the start of this article, Garry, a new addition to our birdwatching team, sent me a USB with loads of his bird photos, I will be using them over the coming months/years.



Boronia is full of historical places, some obvious like the old Progress Hall, and the getting older Post Office and telephone exchange. Some are not so obvious because of facelifts over time but still occupy the same space such as the train station, rail crossing and the cinema. Some are less obvious even though they are hiding in plain sight.

The Boronia Mall will celebrate the 50th anniversary of its opening in September 2023. We can all agree the Mall has seen grander times, but only one business has endured the test of time and remains trading as it originally started as a record shop. The original owner was Clements HiFi & Music, which relocated to the mall from the corner of Boronia & Dorset Rd.

Clements was bought out by the Ciavarella brothers, trading as Sight 'n' Sound, in the mid-1980s. It continues to this day, run by Manny Ciavarella, making it the longest trading business in the Mall, coming up to 35+ years, and in turn a piece of Boronia history. There were originally five Sight 'n' Sounds in Melbourne, now due to attrition and changing circumstances, only two still operate. The other, run by his brother Ciro, is in Northcote Plaza Shopping Centre

What is the secret to their success?

I asked Manny when I called in to visit recently and his unswerving reply was, "Good customer service." But, I believe it's a little bit more than that. Manny has seen many changes during his years running the store. From the halcyon days of vinyl and cassettes, where three people were needed behind the counter to cope with the customers, to the introduction of CDs and the rise of the internet age with digital downloads and music streaming, pushing for the need to adapt to the ever-changing market.

It is not a secret that record shops have disappeared just as quickly as the local Milk Bar over the last few decades. Even with the rise in popularity of vinyl records in recent years, it is a given that the glory days of the 1970s and 80s are long gone. It's this ability to adapt, using industry knowledge, experience and customer service that has given Sight 'n' Sound its longevity. This was evident to me when I recently purchased a 1960s portable record player to recondition. The first place I went to source a stylus (needle) was Sight 'n' Sound. Manny has recognised that people are always looking for something music related. Now



that giant retail stores like Kmart and Target have completely removed music and film (CDs & DVDs) from their inventory, this has opened up a new market for Manny as people who still enjoy these formats, especially DVDs, give more weight to the Sight side of the store's name. Manny says these days most of his customers are searching for older music and films that are no longer available and he is using modern technology and his experience to source these items locally, and overseas.

It was not until I spent some time in the store, with a few return visits, that I realised how social the shop is. Manny, though he runs the store alone these days, still has a constant stream of people coming in to chat, enquire about orders or browse. Often a simple inquiry will just develop into a full-blown conversation as he seems to find time for everyone. Adding to his 'good service' mantra is a personal and genuine attitude towards the customer.

Manny is full of great stories from the old days when business was brisk and they sold so many records that they were an official chart store for the 3XY Top 40 charts, and how catalogue numbers were the be-all and end-all of ordering with suppliers. You could see these notated on the charts themselves on every song listed and every month a huge folder of these numbers was sent to the store to add to the constant stream of new releases in a massive tome called the Platterlog, thus lending credence to the adage that record companies only ever saw their artists as numbers and sales. Manny is quick to point out, that this is

still how music is ordered today.

One overriding thing that I personally love about the store is the aesthetic that I believe a record shop should be. Covered in promotional posters, racks full of music and a counter that stands in front of a set of wall-to-wall, floor-to-ceiling shelves full of vinyl covers, memorabilia, discs for the sleeves in the racks, and a million other things you could never remember if you turned around and were forced to recall immediately. There are also many related items to occupy your attention, such as T-shirts, posters and those "oh, I need one of those things" accessories like blank CDs, cassettes, and VHS cartridges and cases. The store is also one of few in the Country that carries the reissues of some of the classic Australian albums from the mid to late 1970s, which I thought I would never see again. Manny still has a wide range of record stylus' from the days when every home had a record player or cabinet. And what he hasn't got he can get.

Sight 'n' Sound also offers a service that transfers records, super 8, slides and video cassettes into digital formats for those who want to store or preserve their collections and memories.

In retrospect, Sight 'n' Sound is a boomer paradise. So next time you're in JB HiFi and can't find what you're looking for or the person behind the counter says it is no longer available, think local. Sight 'n' Sound may have the memories you are looking for. If not, Manny will try and find them for you.

CONGRATULATIONS

Boronia and The Basin Community News have won this year's Best History Story award. The judge said of our entry:

Mystic Park was an early 1950s housing development proposed for The Basin and is representative of many other failed or aborted housing sub-divisions in the outer suburbs and long forgotten towns such as Moola, between Emerald and Cockatoo on the Puffing Billy line, which never eventuated and the many towns, especially on the gold fields, which rose and fell and disappeared within a few years.

It is also representative of the reach of developers where nothing is sacred – pristine bush land – and all land is just ripe for subdivision — mirrored today where developers are desecrating our suburbs by knocking down single family homes and building multiple units. However, no government of any persuasion, seems to care about this rampant development, but we as a community are fortunate that in the 1960s the Government at the time restricted the development of Mystic Park and as Danny wrote 'began progressively buying back properties, demolishing any buildings and incorporating the land into the Ferntree Gully National Park' which later became the Dandenong Ranges National Park.

Great article by Danny looking at the subdivision and his archaeological expedition along what would have been the main roads on the Estate — Alamein and Tobruk Avenues (now tracks) to see what remains of Mystic Park Estate — 'driveways and property entrances are all but overgrown these days, but a look up the hill shows what seems to be garden terraces made with rocks....flat graded area are evident' as well as the odd exotic plant. He also found the remains of a house. A worthy winner recording a fleeting part of our history.

The BBCN Team thanks regular contributor Danny Nolan for his hard work. Not just on the Mystic Park article, but on all his contributions through the years. This recognition is well deserved.



Young musicians from all over Victoria gather for a week of inspiration & HIP music-making!

The Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra's Young Mannheim Symphonists program has been brought to a triumphant conclusion for 2022, where 31 young musicians gathered for a week of intensive music-making in Melbourne.

A celebratory final concert showcased the skills of these aspiring young artists who interpreted orchestral works by Mozart, Beethoven and Emilie Mayer.

Applications for the 2023 instalment of this important national music education program are now open!

Held during the Spring school holidays at Camberwell Grammar School, the Young Symphonists Victorian Mannheim 2022 Intensive was a hive of activity. Students aged 12-21 attended from all parts of the state from Bunyip to Bairnsdale, Bayswater to Balwyn, as well as from regional NSW.

The VIC Intensive was directed from the violin by Rachael Beesley, who was joined by other professional musicians from the Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra as tutors, all specialists in historically informed performance (HIP) on period instruments.

After four days of workshops, tutorials and orchestral rehearsals, the Young Mannheim

Symphonists presented a stunning orchestral concert. The students performed standing, and utilised historical instruments such as classical bows, natural trumpets, natural horns and period timpani to bring renewed vigour and life to repertoire from the Classical and Romantic periods.

Director Rachael Beesley said: "It is extremely rewarding to support the next generation of musicians by exploring core symphonic repertoire and works by the female composer Emilie Mayer with these curiously-minded voung musicians."

"Sharing our passion and knowledge of Classical and Romantic repertoire from an historically informed perspective, resulted in committed and energetic performances. The students, and the audience of all ages, enjoyed the inspiring delivery of the final concert in this unique music intensive."

The VIC Intensive was the fourth and final instalment of this year's national Young Mannheim Symphonists program. Young Mannheim Symphonists was founded in 2014 by the Australian Romantic & Classical Orchestra's founding artistic director, the late, legendary Richard Gill AO, together with current coartistic directors, Rachael Beesley and Nicole van Bruggen.

Nicole van Bruggen explained why this program has a unique role in the country's youth orchestra landscape:


"What makes the Young Mannheim Symphonists a unique youth orchestra program, is that we offer the students, in a very compact week, a lot more than just rehearsals and a concert. We give the students engaging workshops in all manner of areas, specifically around historically informed performance, including introductions to period instruments, mental and physical for musicians and rehearsal wellbeing techniques. We have guest speakers and tutors from all over Australia, and we invite specialists in their fields to inspire the students. We approach the music in an historically informed performance style, not because we would always wish the students to perform this way, but because we want them to come away from this program understanding that there are a myriad of ways to interpret the music of the past."

Applications for the 2023 instalment of the Young Mannheim Symphonists, including Intensives in Victoria and New South Wales, and a National Academy in Brisbane, have just opened. Some feedback from participants include: "Being able to explore music beyond following the score to a T, has really opened my eyes to how people can play music and express emotions through it."



"This was such a special opportunity to play these particular pieces with such passionate and mature musicians."

"There is so much positive I could say about my experience but one thing I must say is: This program was really fun."




COMIC CREATOR

Remembrance Day, which was originally called Armistice Day, commemorated the end of hostilities in World War 1, with the signing of the armistice on November 11, 1918 - the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month.

On the first anniversary of the armistice in 1919, one minute's silence was instituted as part of the main commemorative service. After the end of World War 2 in 1945, the Australian & British governments changed the name "Remembrance Day" as an appropriate title for a day which would commemorate all war dead and injured.

The ceremony in Knox is unique in that it is almost entirely conducted by students from local primary & secondary schools. These students will participate with the readings, wreath laying, raising & lowering of the flags ably supported by a school choir. The involvement of the younger generation demonstrates an enthusiasm and empathy in remembering this special day.

Everyone is welcome to attend where provision will be made for the public to lay a poppy in remembrance.

Anniversary of the Ending of the Great War

On Sunday 6th November 2022 the cessation of World War 1 will be remembered at a ceremony to be conducted at the Knox War Memorial situated in the "Tim Neville Arboretum", Dorset Road Boronia.

The service will commence at 10.55am and residents and friends are invited to attend. For those wishing to march, "form up" will be at the rotunda in Francis Street, Ferntree Gully at 10.45am at the very latest. Participants in the march are encouraged to wear their medals and/ or medals of their relatives who have served in the armed forces.

The ceasing of hostilities brought about the mobilization of over 70 million people and left between 9 & 13 million people dead, many with no known grave.

Update on Development Victoria plans for Knoxfield site

Council received over 1,000 objections to the two planning applications from Development Victoria, for a two stage subdivision and construction of wetlands at the former Department of Primary Industries site on the corner of Burwood Highway and Scoresby Road (621 Burwood Highway) in Knoxfield.

Objectors were invited to attend a planning consultation meeting with the applicant on 1 September 2022. This meeting was well attended and the applications and objections are now being assessed by Council planning officers. The applications are expected to be considered by Council before the end of this calendar year.

It is proposed to subdivide the site and remove

Knox City Council has welcomed the Victorian Opposition's commitment of \$5 million towards the redevelopment of Lewis Park in Wantirna South. Council has an exciting plan to turn the 40-hectare parkland in to Knox's central park.

Some elements of stage two of the plan are contingent on external funding. The Opposition's pledge of \$5 million will enable us to deliver a new sports pavilion, revamped skate park and BMX area, multi-purpose courts, a mountain bike track, new nature playground, picnic and barbecue areas, and flexible car parking for potential future community events.

Community sports clubs to benefit from the major redevelopment include Fairpark Junior Football Club, Knox City Cricket Club, Wantirna South Cricket Club and Wantirna South Junior Football Club.

This follows the announcement of funding for stage one of the plan earlier this year. The work to restore a 1.6 kilometre stretch of Blind Creek from an underground concrete pipe into an aboveground natural waterway will begin next year. It includes creating wetlands with pedestrian bridges, waterway

vegetation to create 105 lots and a wetland with cycling and walking tracks, open space areas and a bird lookout. The proposal also includes removal of a dam, often referred to as Lake Knox, once the new wetlands have been established.

Recently repair works have been carried out to improve the structural integrity of the spillway from the dam. These works were not part of the proposed redevelopment and did not require approval from Council

Back in 2018 the Minister for Planning rezoned the land and changed some of the overlays in order to facilitate development of the surplus land for residential, commercial and retail purposes.

At the time Council made a submission to the rezoning process that called for the sensitive biodiversity on this site to be retained, protected, and

enhanced. The submission highlighted the existing dam and recommended not changing the environmental significance overlay until the new wetland had been established.

Mayor Cr Laukens said Council can only judge the planning permit applications according to the planning controls that now apply to that land.

"There are very strict rules that apply to how we make planning decisions. If we don't follow those rules our decision and any opportunity we have to influence a development application can be called into question and thrown out by VCAT or the Minister," Cr Laukens said.

Melbourne Water is delivering the first stage of works and contributing \$11.1 million. Council is contributing \$3.5 million and the Victorian Government is contributing \$2.5 million from the Integrated Water Management program.



MESSED UP IN MOZAMBIQUE A Strummer's Story by Rob Fairbairn

"I like to spend some time in Mozambique, the sunny sky is aqua blue." So sang Bob Dylan in 1976 in a song from his hit album, Desire. "It's very nice to stay a week or two," he continues and paints pictures of a place with 'pretty girls' in 'a magical land' where 'couples dance cheek to cheek.'

Sounds idyllic doesn't it? I hate to break the spell but he never went within cooee of the place, let alone stay for any length of time. But I did

For some years I was a successful solo entertainer, a singer guitarist leaning towards Australian folk and country. My job took me to places as far flung as Japan, Russia and Sri Lanka but it was in Maputo, Mozambique, on the African shores of the Indian Ocean that I had my worst and most embarrassing experience as a travelling troubadour.

The gig was a promotion for "Australian Gastronomy and Culture" in the Hotel Polano Serena, a colonial era hotel built in the 1920s. My job was to wander around the restaurant, in my akubra and moleskins, blow some didgeridoo, sing a few songs and generally enhance the vibe suggested by the menu which featured Aussie beef, lamb and seafood.

Ordinarily this would have been a dream job.

For a week I was working only two or three hours a day, staying in a comfortable suite in a luxury hotel. But I was exhausted. I hadn't seen home for almost two weeks and was severely sleep deprived. Maputo came at the end of a five-day promotion in Colombo, Sri Lanka with a Prestige Foods International itinerary that would have tested even the most hardened road warrior. As a result my much anticipated engagement turned into an ordeal.

In Colombo I was working for PFI; in Maputo my boss was the Hotel Polano with PFI coordinating the event and my itinerary. Because I was working for two different employers, somehow it had been decided that after the first promotion I would fly back to Australia, then immediately fly out again for the second. By the time the 'tour' ended I estimated I had clocked up almost 42,000 air-kilometres and countless waiting hours. What sort of sadist would impose such a thing on a poor musician?

I arrived in Maputo, tired and disoriented but manfully tackled the engagement. Each lunchtime, I would take the lift down to the restaurant and casually meander between the tables, playing my didgeridoo for the unsuspecting diners. I had deliberately sought out that instrument from Bruce Rogers, a renowned maker and player. I was starting to master this instrument, made from a beautiful piece of timber from Northern Australia, with its unique, ancient tones providing the perfect conversation starter on the subject of Australia and its pristine produce.

But I saw little of my surrounds. The 'sunny sky' may have been 'aqua blue' but could only be viewed from my small window. I was so jetlagged, I hadn't the energy to leave my room and had been advised anyway not to leave the hotel alone. As the week wore on I took the elevator down to the restaurant with increasing reluctance. My interactions with the diners became shorter and less coherent. My time in Mozambique had been more than miserable and I could not wait for this ordeal to end.

But the worst was yet to come. Thus far I had diligently heeded the warning not to drink the local water but on the eve of my departure, in my state of extreme exhaustion I must have swallowed while showering, or cleaned my teeth from the tap. The cause is unimportant but the effect was catastrophic. I was awakened in the early hours by painful abdominal rumblings followed closely by errant blasts from below, blurting out like the notes of my didgeridoo. I felt terrible, not just for my own pain but also for the housemaid who would unwittingly find what I had left behind!

After paying the obligatory bribe to the baggage attendant for the safe passage of my instruments, I somehow managed to make it onto the plane to begin the long, uncomfortable journey home. I was sick and sore, tired and listless all the way from from Maputo to Johannesburg, onto Perth, then Sydney and finally back to Melbourne. And to top it off my didgeridoo got lost in transit!

As for Bob Dylan, I think he would have changed his tune had he experienced what I went through in Mozambique.

November 21 is World Numbat Day



As having more than one heart seems troublesome for him, Numbat feels he must choose which one to keep. After evaluating the pros and cons of each heart, Numbat discovers that the best option is to keep both hearts, so that he will be both kind and strong.

Fun Facts to know about Numbats

They are marsupials found mainly in forests in Western Australia. Although they are cousins to Wombats, Kangaroos and Wallabies, unlike many smaller marsupials, they do not have a pouch for their babies, having up to four babies at a time. They sleep during the night and are awake in the day.

How big are they?

Numbats can grow up to 45 CM long, including their tail which can be almost half their length. They weigh up to 700 grams.

What do they eat?


Numbats mainly eat termites, but also eat ants and insects. Typically, they eat up to 20,000 termites each day, catching them with their long, sticky tongues.

How do they find food?

They have a good sense of smell. They can smell termites on the ground.

Where do they live?

In hollow logs or dig burrows under the ground.





KIDS ZONE

When is the best time to teach your child to swim?

With the onset of summer, a common question is: How early can a child learn to swim?

Experts suggest that they cannot actually swim until about four years old. However, they can become water aware and water confident much earlier. Your baby can start "swimming lessons" as early as 4 months, although at this age it is more about introducing them to water experiences and developing their confidence and enjoyment of it.

First experiences with water are critical for you child to develop a desire to participate. There is no sense forcing a child to do anything they are uncomfortable with. Having fun together is a big part of success. Babies learn a lot from observing and mimicking, so ensure you are actively participating yourself and encourage them to play. You can prepare your baby for early swim lessons through bath routines. Encourage water play with splashing and bath toys to familiarise them with the water environment. Water and room temperature are important to keep baby comfortable, so that the whole experience is both fun and comfortable.

Australia reaps the benefits of learning to swim in many ways. We are among the top



three swimming nations in the world, despite being much smaller population than USA (Number 1) and Germany (Number 2). We have a good water safety record compared to most countries (comparing drownings per population). This is partly because our children learn to swim at an early age, partly because swimming is a very popular sport here and our climate is conducive to water activities. Water sports are part of our national identity. Many social activities happen around water, whether that be pools, lakes, rivers and of course the ocean which we are surrounded by. Australians learn to swim because they want to, not because they are forced to. Only about five percent of the adult population of Australia cannot swim, and many of these migrated to Australia as adults. They too can take learn to swim lessons - it is never too late to enjoy a safe splash.



"The funding will directly support revegetation and environmental preservation



RECYCLING YOUR UNWANTED CLOTHING

Working out how to recycle clothing you no longer want can be confusing.

Clothing, textiles or shoes must not go into your recycling bin. "When clothing ends up at our Recycling Facility in Dandenong South it gets tangled in the conveyor belts and causes all kinds of issues" said Anouk Hengeveld, Knox Council Waste Education Officer.

Consider giving clothing in good condition to a friend, your extended family, your local opportunity shop or social enterprise retailer. There are also many services that will collect from your front door step/letter box.

If you have clothing that is not in good repair and not really wearable, you can order a box from Upparel for a nominal fee and post it back to the company to ensure that you will prevent your clothing ending up in landfill.

The World Resources Institute notes that one garbage truck-load of clothes is burned or sent to landfill every second around the world.

Australians are the second highest consumers of textiles in the world after the United State on a per capita basis. Each year, Australians purchase an average of 27 kilograms of new clothing.

By recycling your used clothes and also shopping at charity shops and social enterprise retailers, you can help make a positive environmental impact.

Another way that you can make your clothing go further and for longer is by mending or upcycling your clothes. Knox Council is providing a free, 2-part workshop at Coonara Neighbourhood House (daytime) and Orana Neighbourhood House (night-time) on the 17th and 24th November.

Proposed Knoxfield development

Council has received over 1,000 objections to planning applications two Development Victoria for the site at the corner of Burwood Highway and Scoresby Road in

The proposal includes the creation of 105 lots and a wetland. It includes removal of a dam, often referred to as Lake Knox, after new wetlands are established.

Objectors were invited to attend a planning consultation meeting with the applicant in September. This meeting was well attended and the applications and objections are now being assessed by Council planning officers. The applications are expected to be considered by Council before the end of this year.

Knox Library takes shape

It is exciting to see work starting on the new Knox Library in the old Myer store at Westfield. Knox is our busiest branch and the new library will be twice as big as the old one, with a garden

room, meeting rooms, computer area, desk spaces, quiet study booths, lounges, a youth area and children's area.

The new library will be a contemporary space where people can meet, read, study, work or just relax, while still enjoying valued traditions like children's story time, school holiday and afterschool activities, guest speakers and book discussions.

Council's Youth Information Centre, currently near Headspace behind Knox Ozone, will relocate into the library once complete.

During construction, the temporary Knox 'Express' Library continues to be available, located in the former Cash Converters site behind Knox Ozone.

LOCAL SPORTING UPDATE

I have always fought hard to ensure our sporting facilities in Knox remain some of the best in the state, because I believe they benefit the entire community.

Community sport is truly the lifeblood of our community. Our clubs provide their members with more than just sport. They are places of belonging, purpose, and friendship. They help keep people active and engaged and provide our kids with purpose and older mentors.

The last couple of years have proved so hard for the many in our community who couldn't play sport and engage with their sporting communities and after such a difficult period it's wonderful to see them thriving again.

Excitingly, despite the delays of COVID many of the projects we secured funding for are now either complete or underway.

Some of these include: An Upgraded deck at Boronia Bowls Club, to improve accessibility -completeNew floodlights at Tormore Reserve, Boronia (pictured)— complete. Refurbishment of existing clubrooms and new female clubrooms at Marie Wallace Reserve (Bayswater Park) -construction underway. New community hub and pavilion at Fairpark Reserve, Ferntree Gully —construction underway. \$4m for the new Knox Regional Netball Centre - soon be completed. However, I am very concerned that funding for one important project is at risk of being scrapped by the new federal Labor.

Early this year I was pleased to secure \$5m of funding for a new pavilion at Tormore Reserve, Boronia. However, since the election there has been no action taken by the Federal government to see this through.

As many of you know, this reserve is home to the Boronia Football and Netball Club and the Boronia Cricket Club. The leaders of these clubs have been pressing for upgrades of these 40-year-old clubrooms for over ten years.

They are great local sporting clubs, and they deserve an upgraded pavilion. I am hopeful the new government recognises this and delivers the promised funding.

I will continue to fight to see this project completed.





PROPOSED BORONIA STATION REBUILD A GAME CHANGER

Knox City Council welcomes the announcement that if re-elected, the Victorian Government will rebuild Boronia Station and deck over the southern rail trench to create new pedestrian and community spaces.

Knox Mayor, Cr Susan Laukens said rebuilding the station is central to Council's plan to bring new life to the suburb and one of the key advocacy priorities identified by Council.

"We've long heard that Boronia is old, tired and in need of significant investment to give it new life and improve liveability for those who call it home," Cr Laukens said.

"The train line cuts the centre of Boronia in half and the station feels dark and unsafe even in daylight hours. Decking over the trench will create a welcoming public space and encourage more people to walk around and spend time in the centre.

"We are thrilled with the Victorian Government's commitment of \$60 million towards Boronia station. With this investment the train station precinct will become the new heart of Boronia and support a strong local economy."


"Improving this precinct was identified as a critical lever in Council's plan to renew the central area of Boronia. Plans like these need significant investment and Council needs state and federal governments to support us in delivering these plans for our community.

"I am proud of the tireless work of Council in advocating to all levels of government and different sides of politics to help us achieve our vision for Boronia.


Public transport services are well used by residents driving to Boronia station from a large catchment, which extends into the foothills.

The centre's current trade catchment is expected to increase from 155,000 to 177,000 people by 2041.

The Australian Government has made a commitment to deliver additional commuter car parking and the Victorian Government has already allocated about \$2.5 million to improve the centre of Boronia.







COUNCIL CONSIDERS ITS FUTURE IN KINDERGARTEN

Council is considering its future role as a kindergarten service provider in response to Victorian Government reforms that will increase kindergarten by 15 hours a week for both three and four year olds over the next 10 years.

Council operates 29 sessional kindergarten sites at a cost of \$3.3 million per annum. As hours increase, a key challenge will be the requirement for more classrooms and outdoor learning spaces at kindergartens.

Knox Mayor Cr Susan Laukens said while Council welcomes the government's reforms, the rising cost of providing kindergarten services is diverting financial resources from other much needed services.

"We recognise that getting children into a formal learning environment at a young age is beneficial for their social, emotional and cognitive development," she said. "Council makes a significant financial investment into kindergarten services and facilities to support children and families but fully funding the additional resources required to implement the reforms is beyond our financial capacity.

"If Council decides to make any changes to how it provides kindergarten in the future, this will take some time to be implemented and will not affect planned services in 2023.

"We will convene a demographically representative community panel to ensure a high level of engagement, transparency and accountability in considering a full range of issues relating to kindergarten services.

"The panel will be informed by feedback provided from kindergarten families and the broader community. We need to ensure feedback is representative of our whole community and the panel will ensure that the diverse views and perspectives of our community are heard."

Council will appoint an independent consultant to recruit and facilitate the community panel. The community will be invited to provide feedback on what Council should consider as part of the service review. This will commence in October 23.
