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Editorial Boronia Heights Imbalance

When I first contemplated standing for election to Knox City Council I was employed by the Bureau of Statistics, doing interviews and gathering data. On one occasion I encountered a local family who had lost their home when the landlord sold it.

A generous neighbour offered to share their home until they could find another. So, with two families sharing a house meant for a single family, they were taken off the emergency housing list because they were deemed to have a home.

This then became my first issue if I became a councillor, and the turning point of my decision to stand. Elected, I was full of confidence. Over the next twelve years I attended numerous seminars and advisory committee meetings, mostly on the environment, town planning, including housing and homelessness, waste management and community development. These twelve years took me to every state and territory in the country, but failed to provide a solution to the homeless and home insecurity crisis. I failed in my quest and can only hope that the family finally found the home they deserved.

But the homeless are still with us. So too are those who continue to search for a solution.

There is no doubt that the Victorian Government's plan to fully develop the redundant site of the former Boronia Heights Secondary College would be a significant contribution to easing the Boronia share of the housing crisis. But is it fair and practicable?

On the question of fairness, it is not fair for our local residents to be without a fitting home, nor is it fair for local residents to have their neighbourhood transformed into a more rowdy place. What is needed now is a sensible search for a sensible compromise to deliver a blend of appropriate housing and remnant bushland. I fear that the door has already been closed to such common sense.

It particularly manifests itself when I see my two grandchildren, Wren and Eli, both 4 -year- olds, cute as a button, both of them! Still a very common bird in northern Australia, where remote beaches are accessible to these little gems to nest on, in Victoria their numbers have decreased dramatically since us white blokes got here; dogs, foxes and feral cats and human activity causing them to decline to the point that you rarely see them. French Island is one place that nesting has occurred in recent years; a lot of hard work going on there to ensure that they are successful. We can all do our bit when walking our canine friends on beaches, always have them on a leash. Education about the Hooded Plover has seen a turnaround in people's behaviour to protect this

bird on our Ocean beaches, it just goes to show that so many people, if informed, are prepared to do the right thing. Just remember our beaches are home to many species as well as Hoodies, always look for signage information boards at any coastal beach.

Unless you're a crazy birdo like yours truly, this next bit may not interest you, but the Little Tern is so similar to the Fairy Tern, especially in immature plumage and in non-breeding plumage, it's flamin' ridiculous. In breeding plumage they can be distinguished by having an all yellow bill and a darker leading edge on the wing feathers. This photo was taken recently at Ricketts Point, Beaumaris, and incredibly a Little Tern has also been recorded in that vicinity at almost the same time, phew, that would do my head in!

Well no one got in touch to claim the prize about the quote, "I'll see you swinging from the yardarm" two BBCNs ago. DANDENONG RANGES NATIONAL PARK HABITAT DESTRUCTION

Having grown up at the foothills of the Dandenong Ranges National Park in Boronia for much of my life I have many amazing memories from the park. Meeting echidnas walking along the tracks, observing feeding parties of pardalotes, spine bills and other small insect eating birds moving from tree to tree getting a feed and hearing the deep and load hoots of Australia's largest owl, the Powerful, echo across the valleys.

Being so close to Melbourne and the suburbs but still very much alive with amazing wildlife and plantlife, the Dandenong Ranges National Park is a special place to many of us.

After the big windstorm in 2021 much of the Dandenong Ranges were heavily impacted. Towering trees that had taken so long to grow could not withstand the unusual easterly gale-force wind, heavily sodden soil from massive downpours, and in many cases the being weakened from past development and poor tree management.

A few years on when all the roads and tracks have been cleared of fallen trees there is a nefarious plan to remove fallen trees from the national park by State logging company VicForest to be sold for commercial purposes under the guise of fire management.

The removal of the fallen trees will remove important habitat for wildlife in the area, such as small marsupial carnivore the antechinus, as well as frogs, lizards and fungi. Compaction from the use of 30 tonne machines will also compact the soil and compromise trees that survived the 2021 wind storm.

This has never before happened in Victoria and if it goes ahead will set a dangerous precedent for not just our national park but national parks across the State



Boronia Mall. Did you know?

September 11th of this year commemorates the 50th anniversary of the opening of the Boronia Shopping Town. Primarily the Mall, which also included Kmart and Kmart Foods (later Coles).

Developer Ted Lustig was quoted: "The builders have created a pleasing but functional design... and a delightful shopping atmosphere. The deep, strong tones of the mosaic tiles on the striking feature wall contrasted with the soft white translucent effect of the high suspended ceiling to create a dramatic architectural feature."

"I was interested in building a quality shopping centre that would not become outdated in ten years. And I think we've succeeded."

The complex was officially opened by Victorian Premier of the time Sir Rupert Hamer.

The complete build was 6.5 Million dollars. (\$6.5M in 1973 is equivalent in purchasing power to just over \$73.5 million today.)

The project was completed three months ahead of schedule.

Boronia Kmart was the second built in Australia. The Mall housed 31 specialty stores. The first Manager of the complex was Joseph Kirlen who was a local Ferntree Gully resident and was an umpire for the EFL.

Besides being fully air conditioned the centre had 40 ceiling speakers, 25 wall speakers and another 97 in Kmart and the car park areas.

The Mall's original centrepiece was a stunning light sculpture designed by Local Melbourne lighting firm Mercator and the original architects. It was 6 metres tall and consisted of three concentric circles, the outer measuring 3.8 metres in diameter, from each of these rings hung 9000 strands of coloured plastic discs each 125 mm in mauve, pink and amber.

It has been impossible to estimate how many children since 1973 were entered into one of the Mall's Baby Contests or had their photo taken with Santa.

Famous faces that have appeared at the Mall include Kylie Minogue and Jason Donovan, Gus Mercurio, Robin Jolly, Humphrey B. Bear, Darth Vader & countless VFL/AFL footballers.

In 1974 whilst coming to Melbourne as a guest of the 1974 Logie Awards, famous Italian movie star Gina Lollobrigida popped into the Mall much to the delight of many a local.

The original logo is still visible above the entrance via the Dorset Square car park entry off Chandler Road.

DURING World War II, an anti-aircraft gun crewed by the US Army was placed on One Tree Hill – or was it? This story has semi-official status, appearing as it does in a local CFA document from 2012. But is it true?

The answer appears to be No. To explain that, one needs a little military history, plus knowing something about various types of guns. For those unfamiliar with the subject, high-altitude anti-aircraft weapons in World War II tended to be of 75 mm to 105 mm in calibre.

Possibly the best known anti-aircraft gun in the 1939-45 war was the German 88 mm gun that gave the type its name. (Flug Abwehr Kannonen, anti-aircraft artillery, known to the Allies and their enemies alike as flak) These weapons could fire a shell to a height of 20,000 feet (6,300m) where it would explode, set off either by a barometric pressure switch, or by a radar proximity fuse, triggering the explosive in lethal proximity to an aircraft.

The glaring problem with this story is that there was then nothing on the ground within a two mile (3.2 km) radius of One Tree Hill seriously worth

protecting. Chandler's daffodil farm would hardly be a prime military target, nor Boronia railway station, or the Salvation Army boy's home at The Basin.

United States armed forces were certainly active in the district, but not in a form that lent itself to targeting by enemy bombers. The First US Marine Corps briefly occupied the army camp at Rowville early in 1942, but left for the Pacific after a few months. In 1943, a modest lady from Bayswater was engaged in cracking secret Japanese military codes as part of FRUMEL (US Navy Fleet Radio Unit, Melbourne). But that work was carried out in the city, not in the then outlying Boronia district.

The city of Melbourne would certainly have been a prime target, if not via a land-based attack then by aircraft launched from carriers at sea. The commander of Nepean Coastal Command certainly thought so; he was a Lieut. Col. George H. Knox. Melbourne then housed a number of military

headquarters, and munitions factories working around the clock. The city had some protection from anti-aircraft guns, and also searchlight batteries. But these were in and around the inner city: apart from possibly trying to intentionally start a bushfire, there was nothing worth a cracker to bomb in the Dandenongs.

So while the story is interesting, it appears to have no factual foundation: another urban myth. Only if Chandlers Hill was full of secret tunnels (it isn't) would such an effort be justified. Let this furphy rest in peace (pun intended).



WORLD DUCHENNE AWARENESS DAY A PERSONAL STORY

Thursday 7 September 2023 marks the 10th year of World Duchenne Awareness Day. This international day is dedicated to raising awareness about Duchenne & Becker Muscular Dystrophy (DMD). The theme is "Duchenne: Breaking Barriers," the focus being bringing to light the physical, healthcare, and social barriers facing those living with DMD.

What is Duchenne & Becker Muscular Dystrophy? These conditions are the result of a mutation in the genetic DNA coding region for the dystrophin protein.

Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy is caused by a change in the dystrophin gene. Without dystrophin, muscles are not able to function or repair themselves properly. Becker Muscular Dystrophy, which is less severe than Duchenne, occurs when dystrophin is manufactured, but not in the normal form or amount.

The consequences lead to muscle fibre necrosis and progressive muscle weakness and fatigability.

Up until March 2015, Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy was a condition that I had briefly crossed paths with while studying genetics as part of my science degree. DMD is an X-linked recessive disorder, inherited via the X chromosome. This means that only males are affected if they have a faulty X chromosome; females however can be the carriers.

I remember thinking how terribly challenging it would be to carry this genetic anomaly let alone pass it on to your child. You never think it could happen to you, but it did – to us.

Given the age at which I found myself pregnant, while we didn't have any known conditions, I was always unsettled by the fact that I didn't know my



own genetic family history due to most of my own family members residing overseas. To have the genetic testing is a very personal decision; for us it just seemed like the sensible and responsible thing to do, given my scientific background.

After considering all the testing options prior, we opted for the Chorionic Villus Sampling (CVS) test. This is done at 10-12 weeks gestation, and samples the placental tissue. We had decided that this test would cover all the bases, as well as being able to tell us the sex of our baby.

When you decide to have genetic testing, it's always for peace of mind, a precautionary test. You never expect it to come back with a bad result. When we received a call on a public holiday with the test results, we knew that clearly there must be something wrong.

We were immediately referred to one of the most prominent geneticists at one of the major hospitals. On arrival and after a brief discussion, the geneticist proceeded to work through each of our family trees, stopping at each male and enquiring about the health of the individual. Eventually, we were told that our child had mutations on the X Chromosome in the dystrophin region.

It was at that moment I, at least, had an understanding that the geneticist was referring to DMD and how it was inherited. Even through the shock of that information, I immediately turned to my husband to see whether he had made sense of what was just said.

Information like that raises a lot of questions about inheritance, where it might have come from

knowing the huge gaps and unknowns in my own family history, replaying conversations with family thinking we may have missed crucial information.

We learned that there is a worldwide genetic database for those affected by DMD and the carriers, and a log of how each of the types of mutations affected those that had inherited them. The mutation discovered in our child was unique and very large; it had never been seen before.

Through further blood testing, I discovered that I was a carrier, and that our child had inherited the mutation from me. After looking through the database and consulting with other geneticists around the world, our geneticist could not concretely tell us how this genetic change would be expressed. Unfortunately, sometimes there are no immediate answers, but there's also the possibility that the mutation may have been spontaneous, which happens more than we know.

This diagnosis, for the both of us clearly came with a barrage of emotions attached to it, and the realisation that there was a very big difference between how I handled it and how my husband processed it. One thing that does come from such an event is that you learn a lot about yourself and your spouse. For some, this kind of thing will break you, for others you ride the bumpy road and come out stronger on the other side.

Nature is random and imperfect, and it doesn't always get it right. My studies in genetics which included DNA replication, mutations and the like had shown that although these processes are robust, they are also fragile. I drew comfort from this knowledge which helped me. That was MY WAY of making sense of the chaos.

For others, rationalising such a diagnosis comes in many different forms, whichever way you choose to make sense of it, there is no right or wrong way and what you decide to do with that diagnosis is also a very personal choice.

Every Wednesday evening, 120 people enjoy a healthy meal, sitting down at a table with plates, knives and forks, and with each other. This may be in stark contrast to the rest of their week, especially if they are isolated or homeless or in other ways challenged out there on the fringes.

It's not only a hearty meal.

There are both shower and laundry facilities.

This happens every Wednesday in Ferntree Gully, and every Monday in Upwey.

Foothills Community Care

started this life enriching project back in 2002, when a small group, led by Stephen Barrington, had a vision and began their mission to create open, inclusive communities of love and acceptance, to overcome isolation and despair.

They are providing places where people can connect and engage as they address issues such as family and domestic violence, addictions, homelessness, poverty, mental health issues, and social isolation.

"Many of our friends come from challenging backgrounds, and we seek to create a place offering dignity and hope without judgment, where people can feel safe, valued and loved.

"Our connection often begins by providing a hearty, nutritious, home-cooked meal to all who walk in. However, it is much more than just a meal, it is a welcome into a positive and inclusive community for people who may not connect anywhere else. For many it is a hand up, not a handout."

ORANGE SKY LAUNDRY and ONE VOICE MOBILE SHOWERS

The **Orange Sky** mission is to provide a platform for every day Australians to connect through a regular laundry and shower service. The focus is on creating a safe, positive and supportive environment for people who are too often ignored or who feel disconnected from the community. Our volunteers are not social workers or experts on homelessness - they are empathetic listeners and great conversationalists (www.orangesky.org.au). Orange Sky began in 2014 by two friends in Brisbane.

"From sitting down on our orange chairs and chatting with friends, we've learnt that although access to laundry and shower services is important, it's the conversation and regular connection that create the biggest impact in the community."

Each week, all over Australia, thousands of volunteers help to positively connect our friends doing it tough by providing access to free laundry, warm showers and genuine, nonjudgemental conversation. We always partner with service providers, such as food vans or drop-in centres and make sure that we set up at locations where our friends feel most comfortable.

One Voice was established in 2012 after founder Josh Wilkins spent 6 months on the streets of Melbourne (by choice) to experience what homeless people did on a daily basis, and identify what he could do to help in a practical manner. Josh identified two concerns:

The obvious, the need for safe secure accommodation and The hidden, access to a hot shower

One Voice now has services in operation around Australia. They have helped restore dignity to 250,000 people who experience homelessness nationally. (www.onevoice.org.au)

26 September is World Cassowary Day

A cassowary must be one of the coolest birds out there—as tall as a person, with a helmet on its head, a vivid blue and purple neck with long drooping crimson wattles and piercing amber eyes—wow what a combination!

There are three species of Cassowaries in the world living in Australia, Indonesia and Papua New Guinea

The Southern cassowary lives in Australia, in Far North Queensland's tropical rainforests, melaleuca swamps and mangrove forests.

It is a ratite—a large flightless bird, and is our heaviest, but is beaten in height by the emu.


It likes to eat fallen fruit, with over 283 species of plants recorded in its diet!

Known as a rainforest gardener, cassowaries



play a vital role in maintaining diversity in rainforest trees. They swallow fruit whole, digesting the pulp and passing the seeds unharmed in large piles of dung which can contain 100s, if not 1000s of seeds! Now they are an endangered species due mainly to loss of their habitat.

Queensland parks are working with the community to educate and raise awareness about cassowary conservation. They also undertake the rescue, rehabilitation and release of cassowaries that require assistance, ensuring they are placed back into quality habitat where they will have sufficient food.

- 1. Why are Cassowaries considered to be fantastic fathers?
- A. The father cassowary incubates the eggs alone and when they are hatched he feeds the chicks by mashing up fruit and catching insects for them. He raises them until they are up to 18 months old and is very protective of them.
- 2. Are Cassowaries the biggest bird in the world?
- A. No, but they are the second heaviest (after the Ostrich) and the third tallest (after the Ostrich and Emu).
- 3. How high can a Cassowary jump?
- A. They can jump 2 metres straight into the air, high enough for a full grown adult to walk underneath them.
- 4. What is the casque or helmet on their head for?
- A. The casque of a cassowary is hard and can measure up to 7 inches long. As cassowaries run through dense forests, they lower their head and the casque clears a path through branches and other vegetation.
- 5. Are Cassowaries dangerous?
- A. Yes. They have sharp claws and powerful legs, so they can do a lot of damage if they are provoked or angered. Normally they are shy and not overly aggressive, so attacks are rare.



'You think the birth is important, it is, but you gotta think past it as well. A lot of the (available) reading is up until the birth.'

When I asked about advice for our little boy he said: 'I want you to learn, hopefully, all our good traits.' (I piped in with 'And forget the bad



ones!'). 'Manliness is not always just what you think is manly, it's helping, it's doing some of the boring things as well as the fun things.

'Have fun, you're going to regret things but I want to encourage you to do things that you want to do and not what I want you to do.'

Finally 'Practical Pete' took a back seat and he had some nice words to share. 'It has been surprising to see how excited everyone has been about Little One's arrival. We have received gifts from people that I didn't even know (and were only acquaintances of Kim's). And when the baby recognises you... that's probably one of the best things about fatherhood.'

As I have watched Pete grow, I have rediscovered how dedicated and caring he is. Despite my teasing, his practical side has saved me from going insane and his willingness to learn together has made us a strong team. We've had some rough patches but Pete has been in the passenger seat as I bumped us over potholes and speed humps.

MARGARET LEWIS

A woman of loving service to her family and the local community

2 December 1937 - 10 July 2023

Margaret Lewis (nee Collings) was born in 1937, the first of three children and she lived in East Preston. She loved her childhood and had an exceptional bond with her father and her brother Max. Marg engendered in her children a deep love and respect for their father Doug too. She met and married Doug Lewis and together they built a life together as an amazing couple whose lives would touch so many within the wider community and overseas.

Doug and Marg Lewis lived in Boronia for around 50 or so years and were both active in the local community with Doug in leadership roles as a principal for many years in the region. Whilst living in Boronia, Marg had three children - Jenny, Debbie and Greg, but when she was unable to have any other children, she and Doug decided to adopt a son Geoff in 1969, followed by another son, Brad in the 8os. She had so much love to give she decided with Doug to foster. They fostered long term Martin, Sharni, Courtney, Brittany and Kayla and some 60-70 short term foster children. This wonderful loving service to the community was honoured in 2002 with the Boys Town Family of the Year award, it was a national award with 1350 nominations. This award was to be presented at



the MCG by the famous athlete John Landy but no children were allowed. Marg spoke in her own way saying in effect, "No children, then we aren't coming." So, they attended the award ceremony. With the money awarded to them they took the whole family, including foster kids, for a weekend away at the Cumberland at Lorne.

At the heart of her life was her faith and love for God and those put in her care. She expressed that love in so many practical ways including annual Clean Up Australia Days, bus trips for seniors, annual children's camps in Reefton and Dixons Creek, leadership in the Annual World Day of Prayer even into her 80s. Marg ran the People's Pantry in the local community providing food for those in need. She, along with Doug, volunteered in the Kids Hope program in a local school for many years.

In the 1990's Marg and her beloved husband Doug agreed willingly to pastor members of their church in the Solomon Islands for nine years, often traveling by dugout boats over choppy waters to serve the 'sheep' placed in their care. There was no opportunity too big or too small to serve in the community or her church for Marg, she was at the heart of it with her passion, love and hard work.

She will be deeply missed by her much loved husband Doug, all the children she bore, adopted and fostered. A shining light has gone out but her legacy lives on in the lives of all those she touched.

She was a wonderful example of love, compassion and kindness to all who knew and loved her. Marg lived the verse in the Bible that says, "I was hungry and you gave food...I was a stranger and you took me in..." Her funeral was attended by nearly 200 people who came to honour this amazing woman.

In her son Greg's words in his eulogy, he said, "Mum was the salt of the earth... in the pages of history as an absolute bloody legend."



A STRUMMER'S STORY BY ROB FAIRBAIRN VLADIVOSTOK - FINAL CHAPTER - CULTURAL AMBASSADOR

In addition to my role as a wandering minstrel I had a more important duty to perform. The didgeridoo I was playing was to be gifted to the City of Vladivostok and I was to present it.

presentation would occur during a performance at the city's opera house. A young interpreter drove me there and as we rode through rainy Vladivostok streets, I was stricken with a sudden feeling of unease. I was alone in a car with a complete stranger, in a city where there were drive-by shootings, possibly car-jackings and kidnappings. I imagined the headlines back home, "Aussie entertainer missing," "Country singer kidnapped in Vladivostok" or "Melbourne musician held to ransom in Russia." My fears of course were totally unfounded but nevertheless, I was very relieved when we pulled up outside the stage door.

The hand-over was brief but nerve racking. A few words of Russian were spoken, I mumbled a response, took a deep breath, played a short sequence, presented the didg then was quickly ushered backstage.

When the curtain fell and the cast came offstage, I felt much more at ease. I was in my comfort zone, unwinding with other musos after a gig. A chair was found for me, a glass thrust into my hand, and before I knew it I was caught up in a round of speeches and "Za zdarovyes." We all got on famously and I was treated to impromptu, heartfelt performances of Russian folk songs. When the guitar was passed to me I had to think hard to come up with something suitable. After hearing such passionate outpourings, songs such as "Give me a Home Among the Gumtrees" felt somehow inadequate, so I decided upon Eric Bogle's, "And the Band Played Waltzing Matilda."

It was a wise choice, its message of the futility of war is universal.

After a wonderful time with my fellow entertainers, I was returned to the Dom Peregovorov* where I regaled my colleagues with an account of the afternoon. And to confirm it really happened, on the TV news that evening was a report of the presentation. I was feeling very pleased with myself but there was one more duty to perform.

Mike had arranged a farewell dinner, a special event with invited dignitaries, a lavish meal prepared by Craig the chef and entertainment provided by me. The guest list was impressive and included Cavan Hogue, the Australian Ambassador to Russia, the head of the Australian Meat and Livestock Corporation, the Mayor of Vladivostok and the Governor of Primorski Krai.

It was a memorable evening. The meal was sensational, the star attractions being prime Aussie beef and seafood. The drink was abundant, resulting in yet more speeches and many more "Za zdarovyes." By the time my spot came around the audience was refreshed, replenished and relaxed. Did everyone understand the lyrical nuances of "G'day G'day" and "Botany Bay"? It didn't really matter, but the All Star Aussie/Russki Bush Band was an absolute winner. By that stage of the evening all bets were off as the Australian Ambassador pounded his Beer Box Bongo to within an inch of its life, while the Mayor of Vladivostok's frantic lager-phone solo brought the house down. Was this what Mike had envisioned months ago when his Russian guests joined me in the bush band at Yarra Burn? Again his instincts had been correct.

final My 'performance' on homeward the flight from Osaka, best one forgotten.

couples traveling to Australia on their honeymoon. I had my guitar, so someone thought it would be a good idea for me to serenade them with a couple of Aussie songs. Unfortunately I'd taken advantage of the in-flight hospitality and was still recovering from the activities of the previous ten days. What was made of my drunken attempts to teach the actions of "Give Me a Home Among the Gumtrees" I will never know, for at its completion I slumped back into my recliner and remembered no more of the journey.

I returned home shattered, two weeks of too little sleep and too many "Za zdarovyes," had clearly taken their toll. A few days later I received a call from Mike. He told me that the whole event had been a resounding success, thanks in no small part to my contribution. "You worked very hard," he said, "but I think you underquoted so I'm going to increase your fee. I told you I wasn't a nasty pastie." I immediately added 'honourable' to the list of his attributes.

Vladivostok wasn't the last time I was to work with Mike Murray and his company and there is much more to tell about my time there. If only I could remember the details...

BORONIA CFA CELEBRATES 80 YEARS



The drizzle stopped and the clouds parted to reveal a gorgeous afternoon to celebrate the unveiling of the plaque to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the Boronia CFA. The ceremony was held at its original site adjacent to the Commonwealth Bank on Dorset Road.

Boronia Country Fire Authority (CFA) life member William (Bill) Ireland introduced the proceedings by recalling the history of how in 1942 the Boronia Urban Fire Brigade was formed and the appointment of an air raid warden due to the concerns of attacks by the Japanese. It must be noted that between 1942 and 1943 Australia suffered over 100 bombing raids by the Japanese Airforce on its territory.

In late 1943 the first fire station was built. This was the first of three sites that the Boronia unit called home. Of course, the Boronia CFA has become integral to our community and no one needs to be reminded of the importance of the CFA and its role in protecting this and the surrounding areas.



Bill also made a dedication to John Mcleod AFSM (Australian Fire Service Medal), a fellow volunteer who died in 2018 and served the CFA



for nearly 60 years, and was the only member to serve at all three Boronia bases.

KINDERGARTEN REFORMS PROMPT BIG CHANGES IN KNOX

Knox City Council will stop running standalone kindergarten services and will make its buildings available to other sessional kindergarten providers from January 2025. Council will work in partnership with the Department of Education on an expression of interest process to seek alternate providers.

Mayor, Cr Marcia-Timmers Leitch said there are kindergarten providers already operating in Knox and surrounding areas who are better equipped to grow and adapt their services than Council...

She said, "Council delivers more than 100 services to our community. We need to balance kindergarten services against every other service to determine the best way to deliver value for

our whole community.

"This makes it much more difficult to adapt to changing policy environments and government reforms, especially when funding has not kept up with the cost of providing many of the services we provide on behalf of state and federal governments...

"Council will continue providing sessional kindergarten at the Knox Children and Family Centres in Bayswater and Wantirna...

"Reducing our services to two sites also allows us to refocus on our role in planning for the municipality as a whole. This includes looking at the other roles we can play in supporting kindergarten, including supporting independent providers to establish and grow their services in the Knox area, providing infrastructure to support services and centralising registrations...

"A public expression of interest process will be conducted to identify alternative providers of sessional kindergarten in Knox."

Council conducted a thorough review of kindergarten services over several years which included consultation with staff and the community.

The decision will not come into effect until January 2025. Council-run kindergartens will continue to operate in 2024, offering 15 hours a week for three- and four-year-olds.
