# Little Grassbird (Poodytes gramineus)

#### What Parents and Kids Need to Know About Australia's Social Media Ban for Under-16s

From December 10th Australia's has introduced an amendment to its Online Safety Act which requires "age-restricted" social media platforms to take reasonable steps to prevent users under 16 from having accounts. Major social media platforms including TikTok, Snapchat, Instagram, Facebook, YouTube and Reddit must take 'reasonable steps' to stop under-16s creating accounts. But what does this mean for Australian families, and how can both parents and kids adapt to these new rules?

What is the purpose of the Australian under-16 social media ban?

The new legislation aims to protect kids from harmful content including cyberbullying, exploitation, self-esteem issues and addictive use. Delaying account access gives under-16s more time to build digital, social and emotional skills before diving into the full social media world. Whilst Australia is the first country to introduce this legislation, similar laws are also being proposed in New Zealand and Denmark.

What is the cost of non-compliance?

Australia's under-16 social media "ban" is really a legal requirement on platforms to block or deactivate under-16 accounts, not a criminal penalty on kids. Social media companies will need to verify age, but they must balance accuracy and privacy — and they can't force everyone to hand over their passport.

The cost of non-compliance for platforms is steep — they risk fines up to A\$49.5 million if they don't do enough to block or deactivate under-16 accounts

How will social media companies determine if a user is under 16?

The law doesn't prescribe a single method platforms must choose reasonable steps, and eSafety has published guidelines around different kinds of "age assurance" tech. Whilst these guidelines include the option of uploading document based verification such as driver's licence or passport, platforms must also offer reasonable alternatives for proving age, so that people who don't want to (or can't) use ID have another path. Other options include: Biometric or behavioural inference such as facial-age estimation (using a live selfie), voice / audio estimation, or analyzing usage patterns and Inferred data for example, checking the user's connections, whether they are in youth-oriented groups, or their activity consistent with being under 16.

What other options are there for kids to stay connected?

The fear of losing touch with friends is real, so

parents will need to invite questions and show understanding and empathy about what their kids will see as a loss. Brainstorm alternative ways to stay connected. If they liked TikTok dances, an app like Just Dance could suit; if they want to chat, use closed group chats or messaging apps; and if they enjoy gaming, find multiplayer games where they can connect safely. Stand alone messaging and video calling apps such as facebook messenger and Whatsapp are not part of the ban. Other exemptions are Online gaming such as LEGO play, Educational services such as Google Classroom as well as YouTube kids. Health-support services are also exempt.

The Australian government's new social media ban is an important step toward creating a safer online space for children. By working together, parents and kids can ensure that social media use remains a positive experience.



#### Lincoln's Bookshop

Boronia Mall has had several bookshops. I wrote in this paper, during COVID, about the sad demise of book stores in the area. Thankfully, for some time, we have had the Aussie Veterans selling donated books at excellent prices, but it just didn't seem enough. This is not their fault, concern, or problem. I was always looking for something more. So it was exciting to learn that Lincoln's Bookshop was opening on the upperlevel shop that once housed Gloria Jeans, which had been empty for nearly a decade.

New proprietor Lincoln Moncrieff has run a successful online shop for the last 6 years. Like other new ventures in the area, such as Thompson Coins, Obsession Gaming, and Greg's Stamps Kiosk, Lincoln's Bookshop has evolved from an online store to a brick-and-mortar premise to cope with demand and the growth of its passion.

The shop allows Lincoln to keep a large range of stock that can be inventoried. If it's not on the shelves, there is a good chance it may be 'out the back' thanks to the ample storage area. And he needs it. Before opening the physical shop, Lincoln's online shop relied on his inventory that filled all the rooms in his house and many storage containers.

Lincoln's Bookshop, which opened in early November, not only stocks popular and hard-to-



find pre-loved fiction and non-fiction books, but also includes text and coffee table books of all kinds of special interests. As well as a wide range of retro DVDs, CDs, vinyl, artworks, games, maps, magazines, and comics. Who knows what you'll stumble across in this shop of wanting-to-be-found wonders.

The shop is warm and inviting with wide bookshelves, cabinets, rugs, and large comfortable seating. It's a place to come in and peruse - a treasure trove of retro nostalgia and hard-to-find collectables. I was surprised at the diverse age group of people strolling around, enjoying the atmosphere that Lincoln has created.

Lincoln has many plans for the shop as it evolves and hopes it can become a community space for book enthusiasts and conversation groups. He is a firm believer in community participation and leads by example. I've noticed this myself, seeing Lincoln on my first two visits to the shop, playing a game of chess with customers.

Lincoln's Bookshop, with the new collectables store opening at the northern end of the Mall in late November, has created a bookend of sorts and a new lease of life for the Boronia Mall, with Aussie Veterans Op Shop, the

Second Hand Store with its huge range of console games, Thompson's Coins, Greg's Stamps & Stuff, and Sight 'n' Sound as the new must-go for collectors.

Exciting times indeed, and just in time for the Mall's Christmas Market to be held on Saturday, 13th December.

And, as a footnote: While I was in the bookshop, I was impressed when a lady asked if they had a particular book. One I remember reading 40 years ago, and don't think I'd seen it since. The salesperson replied: "Yes, we do, I saw it just before, out the back." It made me think: Imagine what it will be like when he has his inventory up and running?

# **COVER STORY: Festive Season activities in Knox**



#### Surge in demand for relief services in Knox

Anyone with any doubt about the impact of the rising cost of living needs only to look at the dramatic increase in demand for relief services at Knox Infolink in Boronia.

During 2024-2025, Knox Infolink experienced a 25% increase in demand for food relief. This translates to an additional 60 people each week. The agency conducted interviews with an extra 500 individuals requesting support, with 2,000 people being interviewed throughout the year.

Material aid distribution increased by 50%. This included essential items such as tents, swags and cooking equipment for those sleeping rough, prescription medicine assistance, help with utility bills, clothing, mobile top-ups, MYKI

card top-ups, petrol vouchers and toiletry packs.

Service Delivery Statistics

In total, Knox Infolink provided nearly 35,000 points of service over 12 months. On average, the agency served 300 community members each week. Of these, about 165 accessed emergency relief services, while 145 received a nutritious, free meal through the community breakfast program.

In 2024-2025, 54% were first-time clients. The majority, 67%, resided in Boronia, Ferntree Gully, or Bayswater.

Changing Community Needs

A closer examination of the agency's statistics reveals a 58% increase in employed community members seeking support and an 81% rise in requests for assistance from individuals with no income.

Housing affordability became a more acute issue, with a 72% increase in community members experiencing mortgage stress and a 25% increase in those in private rentals seeking support.

Organisational Challenges and Achievements

Knox Infolink board chair Denise Budge described the year as one of challenges, with ongoing uncertainty around funding security. But also one of achievements. She said the board committed considerable effort to fundraising to address funding shortfalls.

Following a community-wide lobbying campaign, the agency secured \$150,000 from the state government, with assistance from Bayswater MP, Jackson Taylor.

This funding will support the continuation of the much-needed community breakfast program for another 12 months, but support from other government sources for other Knox Infolink

services has been reduced.

Throughout 2024-2025, the community breakfast program served over 10,000 meals to 545 individuals. The program, which operates out of the Boronia Progress Hall, provides a hot meal and a welcoming, supportive environment. Survey results indicated that 90% breakfast guests experienced increased sense



community connection after participating.

Volunteers and Partnerships

The agency's extensive range of support is made possible by more than 130 volunteers, over 80 local businesses and community organisations and several partner organisations. These include Knox City Council, state and federal governments, the Knox Opportunity Shop, Boronia Rotary Club, other community groups, local churches and Cummins Inc.

New Initiatives

Despite funding challenges, Knox Infolink launched several new initiatives in 2024-2025. These included a food pantry outside the Boronia Road office, offering free food and information outside regular office hours.

#### Boronia and The Basin Locals Invited to 'Share the Joy' through the Knox Christmas Support Project

As the festive season approaches, many families across Knox are feeling the strain of rising costs and financial pressures. The Knox Community Christmas Support (KCCS) project is making sure every household across Knox can celebrate Christmas with dignity, warmth, and joy.

Now in its 16th year, this much-loved local initiative brings together volunteers, community groups, and businesses to provide festive food hampers and gifts for children whose families are doing it tough. The KCCS project supports those experiencing unemployment, low income, housing stress, health issues, or other challenges that make the festive season difficult. It also extends a welcoming hand to refugees and asylum seekers who have recently joined the Knox community. The KCCS project operates two collection sites (Boronia and Wantirna), where families can collect festive food hampers and choose from a range of quality toys and gifts for their children. The collection site at the Boronia Progress Hall supports families from Boronia, The Basin, Bayswater, Ferntree Gully,

and Upper Ferntree Gully.

Last year, the project supported 812 people, including 299 children, thanks to the generosity of local donors. Knox Infolink has recorded a 33% increase in emergency relief requests and a 44% rise in homelessness, so community support is more important than ever.

#### Kids Dental Care Making brushing fun and effective

Helping kids develop good brushing habits can feel like a challenge, but with the right approach, it can become easier.

The key is keeping brushing fun, simple, and consistent so kids stay engaged and motivated.

#### Make Brushing Fun

Getting kids excited about brushing often helps, let them pick a toothbrush with their favourite colour or character, musical toothbrushes or brushing apps that play a two-minute tune or song can make brushing feel like a game instead of a chore.

You can also make it a shared activity. Brushing together encourages kids to follow your lead, and seeing you brush helps them understand the importance of taking care of their teeth. For little ones, turning brushing into a countdown, pretend play, or a silly-face contest can keep things positive and playful.

#### Teach Good Technique

Technique matters, even for young children. Parents should supervise brushing until at least age eight or nine to make sure every tooth gets cleaned properly. For toothpaste, use a ricegrain amount for toddlers and a pea-sized amount for kids over three.

Show them how to brush gently in small circles, covering the fronts, backs, and chewing surfaces of the teeth. Don't forget the gums and tongue—these areas can hold bacteria and cause bad breath. Slow and gentle is better than fast and hard.

#### **Build a Consistent Routine**

Kids thrive on routine. Encourage brushing twice a day—after breakfast and before bed. A sticker chart or small reward system can make consistency feel rewarding, especially for younger kids.

#### Keep Up with Dental Visits

Regular dental checkups help catch small issues early and show kids that the dentist isn't scary. With encouragement, fun tools, and a little creativity, brushing can become a natural, enjoyable part of your child's day—helping them build healthy habits for life.

Book your child's check-up in anytime between now and December 20th 2025, and parents/carers will receive 30% off any dental treatment.

While flying down the crab saw the scattered remains.


The crab knew that the tragedy of the friends.

# Pet's Piece: Dental Hygiene Part 2

Last month, we discussed the importance of dental health in pets and shared the story of Stevie the pug, who developed a tooth root abscess and stopped eating due to pain. This month, we're focusing on practical ways you can help keep your pet's teeth clean and their mouth healthy.

#### **Brushing: The Best Outcome**

The best thing you can do for your pet's teeth is simply to brush them, just like we do! Daily brushing is ideal, though we understand that it can be hard to fit into a busy routine. Even brushing twice a week can make a meaningful difference.

Start slowly by getting your pet used to having their mouth handled. You can begin by gently rubbing their gums with your finger and rewarding them with treats, pats, and praise. After a week or two, introduce a soft cloth and, once they're comfortable, progress to introducing dog toothpaste, and eventually a toothbrush and pet-safe toothpaste. We recommend either a finger brush from a pet store or a small, soft children's toothbrush and, of course, only dog-specific toothpaste.

#### Chews and Dental Toys

If brushing isn't always possible, dental chews can help support oral health. Safe options include brands such as: Tasty Bone pet toy, Oravet Chews or Greenies. While these are not as effective as brushing, they can assist in reducing plaque and maintaining dental condition.

#### The Big Debate: Bones

We are frequently asked whether bones are safe for dogs, and the answer truly depends on the individual pet. If you choose to offer bones, they must always be raw, as cooked bones splinter and are highly dangerous.

#### Potential benefits:

Raw bones may help mechanically break down plaque and tartar.

If using raw bones, choose non-weight-bearing bones (e.g., turkey necks, duck frames, rabbit carcasses, lamb ribs). Weight-bearing bones like beef leg bones are extremely dense and can cause tooth fractures, which will lead to tooth root exposure and infections.

#### Risks to consider:

- Fractured teeth
- Bones getting stuck in the mouth or on the roof of the mouth
- Swallowing large fragments that can lodge in the oesophagus or intestines
- Constipation from chewing large marrow bones

If you do offer bones, always supervise your pet and remove the bone once it becomes small enough to



swallow or if they are eating a large amount of the marrow.

#### When Teeth Aren't in Good Condition

If your pet already has visible dental disease or bad breath, we recommend an appointment with your veterinarian and a full oral health assessment and clean under general anaesthesia. This is the safest and most effective way to thoroughly examine the mouth and clean above and below the gumline. In some cases, dental X-rays may be required to understand what is happening.

General anaesthesia allows us to protect your pet's airway and prevent fluid from entering the lungs, remove plaque and tartar both on the tooth surface and under the gums, probe teeth like a human dentist to identify diseased roots and safely extract any painful or infected teeth, or teeth with a lot of decay and bone loss.

#### When to See Your Vet

If you're worried about bad breath, notice changes in eating, or feel your pet's dental care has slipped, we recommend booking a dental check-up to discuss the best plan for your pet.

Knox delivers 34 distinct services from maintaining over 700km of municipal roads, to delivering over 6,000 immunisations and managing over 100 school crossings, 100% of all food premises inspected to the maintenance of over 60 sports fields and 5 libraries, delivery of approx. 35,000 meals on wheels and a multitude of festivals and





As our Little One is now old enough to understand this exciting time, I'm thinking a lot




about what traditions I want to continue and what I want to start.

Carolyn stood on her soapbox outside the town hall, facing a large gathering.

"Mr Mayor, Ladies and Gentlemen, I'm Carolyn Russell. I speak on behalf of the Lancerfield Climate Action Society. In 1989, 1 bought this 'Women's Weekly". She flapped the pages of the pullout booklet. The title,

'OPERATION RESCUE', says, 'WHAT CAN WE DO TO SAVE THE WORLD? The next ten years will be vital.' "This was published almost 40 years ago. Scientists explained all they knew then about global warming and climate change. What needed to be done. But governments worldwide failed to tackle the situation head-on; instead, the greedy and powerful slowed progress.

#### Sight 'N' Sound says farewell

Sight 'N' Sound, while not being the longest tenant in the Boronia Mall (that honour belongs to Di Luzio Jewelers), has still been around for nearly 40 years, which is a very close second, and for the last 25 years, Manny Ciavarella has been front and centre.

Manny, along with his brother Ciro, has seen the rise and fall of the record shops over the years, and after so long in the one business, Manny has decided it's time to retire and enjoy the fruits of those labours and do what he loves most — relaxing and traveling.

Manny's experience in retail has been a wild trip of providence and fate.

Starting his career in insurance, he bought into a video hire shop in Narre Warren. From here, he and his brother entered into a deal where they sold a 50% share of their video shop for a 50% share in a record shop in Brandon Park.

Business partner issues at a higher level resulted in the Ciavarella brothers buying out the other 50% of both businesses, and Sight 'N' Sound was born. This led to an expansion over the years, including stores at different times in Rowville, Dandenong, Endeavour Hills, Forest Hill, Waverley Gardens, Chirnside Park, Brunswick and Northcote. Boronia became their second-ever store when they bought out Clements Records in the Mall in the mid-1980's.

Boronia & Northcote have been the last remaining stores for more than the last decade.

Manny has seen huge changes in the music industry and retail sector over the years.

From having to sell locally made products at recommended retail prices by law to people three deep at the counter, to taking phone orders and ordering from overseas because local record companies can't or won't supply. The phone call sales often outnumber the walk-in sales. From being a 3XY chart shop where record sales were compiled weekly and one of the top 15 record shops in Melbourne, to being one of the few independent record shops where you could buy new CDs, vinyl, and DVDs in the whole eastern suburbs.

The change from physical formats to digital and generational preferences over the decades has hit the once popular record shops hard - something that has changed many retail stores. Just look how many newsagents, bookshops specializing in new titles and DVD stores you see these days.

Manny has weathered all this and leaves the business on his own terms. "The time is right," he said to me after I heard the news and popped in for a visit. He does leave with a bit of sadness, as Boronia has been the longest-running store for Sight 'N' Sound and Manny has many fond memories and states categorically that of all the shops he has owned and worked at, the people in Boronia are far by the best and most pleasant to be around, one of the reasons the shop has been around for so long.


Manny recalls, "All the suburbs are vastly different, but by a long way, the customers in Boronia were a pleasure to deal with on a daily basis."

Manny joins his brother Ciro, who retired a couple of years ago, and all the stock will go to the Northcote shop, which they still have an interest in, and as Manny says, is in "Good hands".

The Boronia store will not reopen after Christmas 2025.

# Final Designs Unveiled For Boronia Station Upgrade

The Victorian Government is releasing the final designs of the new Boronia train station ahead of early works starting in the coming weeks. Minister for Transport Infrastructure, Gabrielle Williams, unveiled the designs, which feature a striking new station forecourt canopy inspired by nearby Dandenong Ranges flora and an expanded concourse to improve connections across the rail line.

A new landscaped plaza between the station and Dorset Road will create more green space and seating, while also providing a new community meeting place and simplifying pedestrian movement between the station and Boronia's shopping precinct.

The station concourse will be widened, with the ticket office relocated to the Erica Avenue entry and the protective services office moved to the Lupton Way entrance – boosting safety through improved visibility across the plaza and station area. Accessibility will be enhanced with an upgraded pick-up and drop-off zone on Lupton Way, better footpaths to both station entrances, and more bike hoops and improved cycling connections.

Community feedback on the design enhanced commuter benefits with new platform shelters, seating and improved lighting, providing comfort and protection from the weather. Additional lighting and CCTV across the precinct will further improve safety.

As part of the project, a new pocket park near the Boronia Junction Shopping Centre will feature garden beds, trees, seating and a nature play area, creating a welcoming green space for the community.

Early works will begin in the coming weeks, including traffic light upgrades at the Dorset and Chandler roads intersection to add a dedicated right-turn arrow for drivers. The Boronia Station upgrade will be completed next year, following major works that have already made the Belgrave Line boom gate free between



Ferntree Gully and Melbourne's CBD, and the Lilydale Line level crossing free – improving safety and reducing congestion across Melbourne's outer east.

Member for Bayswater Jackson Taylor said, "This is the biggest investment into Boronia in a generation and like locals, I'm absolutely stoked to see the release of final designs for a better Boronia Station precinct. From a new landscaped plaza, new platform and concourse amenities – we won't know the place anymore!"

Reflecting on the year, Council worked hard advocating to all sides of politics for greater investment in our community — particularly during a federal election year.

We highlighted the need for better roads and public transport and advocated for funding towards upgrading clubrooms, sports grounds and sports field lighting across Knox. We secured funding commitments of \$4.8M to redevelop pavilions at Carrington Park and Templeton Reserve, and \$10M towards upgrading the intersection of High Street Road and Mowbray Drive in Wantirna South.



Grasses and sedges are an important element the habitat garden. In addition to a canopy tree and a tall mid-storey layer, a ground layer can be full of exciting possibilities small birds, for lizards, echidnas

and beneficial insects.

Some butterflies use grasses to lay their eggs on and their caterpillars will use grasses as a food source.

Try tall Tussock Grasses, Wallaby Grasses and Kangaroo Grass for your garden. Add to these cut-leaf Daisies, purple or white, Bluebells and Common Everlastings and you will have a colourful display that also attracts more butterflies, as well as bees and beetles, which will provide more food sources for the small birds.



Also, provide rocks and logs in a spot that receives the morning sun in the garden. This will become a basking spot for butterflies and lizards.

And finally, the most important element is water. Provide water in hanging bowls for small birds, or bowls on the ground for lizards and echidnas and larger birds. Place rocks and logs on one side with a branch into the pool to help the smaller creatures to access the water without drowning.

Common Tussock Grass Poa labillardieri and Purple-sheath Tussock Grass Poa ensiformis are taller grasses growing from 1 to 1.5 metres high.



Both are adaptable, growing in moist clay-loam soils. Purple-sheath Tussock Grass prefers semi-shade to full shade, whilst Common Tussock Grass likes the full sun and semi-shade. They begin flowering in late October and will be in flower over the hotter months of the year.

Kangaroo Grass Themeda triandra supports native biodiversity by providing habitat and food for insects and small wildlife. Growing up to 1 metre tall, it is adaptable to most soils in full sun to semi-shade. The distinctive flower heads are appearing now in late October and like the Tussock Grasses, will be in flower during the hotter months of the year.

There are many Wallaby Grasses indigenous in Knox. The Velvet Wallaby Grass Rytidosperma pilosum is a small grass growing up to 50 cm. This is just one of many species of Wallaby Grass, which are both tall and small and they make an attractive addition to the indigenous garden.

You will find many grass species available at the Knox Environment Society Nursery. Come along to 1010 Burwood Highway, Ferntree Gully, to see what is available there.

#### **Spring Festival**



The KES Spring Festival on 11th October was a great success. The weather was just right for all our exhibitors, and there were lots of visitors to the Nursery.

Knox Community Gardens was there with a comprehensive array of seedlings, and the Australian Plant Society (Foothills Group) had a very attractive floral display. Gardens for Wildlife had lots of advice on habitat gardening with local native species.

Other displays included the Friends Groups of Knox and Sarah's Arts and Crafts featuring pillow cases, bags, and tea towels, all beautifully decorated with native animals and plants. Sarah's father, Peter, was also there promoting his new book Wombats Do Cube-shaped Poo.

Throughout the day, Tisha was busy with children's activities, and there were presentations and entertainment by our music

group, the Flying Foxes. As well, the Rotary Club of Knox supplied a welcome sausage sizzle.

All in all, it was a successful event and a delight to see everyone there on such a fine day.

On 8th December, we will be holding our Christmas lunch at the Chirnside Country Club. I believe Santa may be attending.




