## Great Knot

*(Calidris tenuirostris)*

You have to be in it to win it. A cliché, but an accurate one. If you don't go in Tattslotto (do they still have Tattslotto?), you're not going to scoop the pool, are you? Not going to catch a big Snapper in your lounge room, either. Right place, right time, sometimes things fall into place. Ain't gunna see a rare bird in the kitchen, gotta get out there, get amongst it. A Great Knot on the beach on a flood tide at Stony Point near Hastings on Westernport Bay, now we're talkin'!

Ok, slow down Deso, a lot of people reading this won't even know what a Great Knot is, let alone be excited you've seen one. Is it something to do with rope or something? Nah, it's a small wading bird which migrates from NE Siberia, and they're as rare as ... in our part of the world.

Many people I speak to lament the drudgery and boredom of international flights, personally my longest flight is to Perth, but yeah, I get it, it must be tough. But these migratory waders do it all under their own steam, imagine the energy to propel yourself from NE Siberia to southern Australia, and then six months later, fly back again. Beggars belief that it can possibly happen, but it does, ya gotta take your hat off to them, amazing!

Not everyone gets it, I mean some people, even birdwatchers, chuck their hands in the air, this is too hard, they all look the same, they're too

hard to id, give me something a bit easier, a Rosella or a Kookaburra, something I can easily hang my hat on.

Push through the pain barrier, guys, the results are worth it! To add another species to your life list is a real accomplishment, I mean I already had Great Knot but had never had such close-up views as this. Shut the gate!

An almost identical bird called the Red Knot is much more common in Westernport, still not a common bird but more likely to be observed.

Picking the difference in a line-up of these two takes an extremely sharp eye. I could not have picked the difference without an extensive search in my field guide, but a member of our group, Bett, nailed it straight away!

One day I'll be that good! Bett has been a birdwatcher in the Friends of French Island group since 1974 (she was just a very young girl) and is a wader expert.

## COVER STORY: The Basin Music Festival comes of age!

The Basin Music Festival is back and better than ever before. On March the 20th, 21st and 22nd, over 100 unique performances are happening for free across “The Basin Triangle.” With free entry, an improved production value, and a vast array of performances to watch, this is your time to find your new favourite artist.

The event will be hosted across four venues in the heart of The Basin, they are; The Acorn Bar and Restaurant, The Oak Tree Tavern, “Festival Hall” (aka the Seniors Centre) and The Basin Pavilion. Boasting six stages, The Basin Music Festival is promising an exciting weekend of live musical entertainment.

The event comes at an important time for music fans. It seems every other week, we hear about another music venue or festival shutting down due to overwhelming costs, changes in how we consume live music, or pressure from large companies taking over the industry. Recently, we have seen this with the loss of “The Beast” out in Brunswick. The Basin Music Festival feels like a heartfelt opposition to this reality. It is an act of love that this festival exists, only made possible by a group of committed volunteers who love the art form and want to spread it to others.

Dan Goldfarb, a committee member for the festival, speaks to the importance of events like this, saying it “brings the community together, promotes arts and culture.” The sense of community has always been a critical part of making and enjoying art, and the festival has given the local community an easily accessible way of meeting other music fans. Dan’s favourite memory of the festival is an ode to this sentiment; he says he enjoyed “playing guitar in an impromptu jam session in one of the pubs



with other committee members at the end of the festival weekend.”

The Basin Music Festival was built from the ground up to be for the local community. “Many community festivals are run by municipal government,” Dan says, “but The Basin Music Festival has always been organised by volunteers.” The festival functions as a not-for-profit, fuelled by support from Knox City Council, company sponsors, volunteers, its members and the dedicated musicians, who are also volunteers.

#### Back to Mallacoota

“To Mallacoota I must go, heave away, haul away, With my caravan in tow, bound for Mallacoota”

“Not another song about Mallacoota”, I hear you cry. I make no apologies for again writing about the place where we’ve been holidaying for over thirty years; it holds so many fond memories. So, pull on your singing boots, your cable knit jumper and sou’ wester, put your finger in your ear and sing along with me to the tune of that old sea shanty, “Bound for South Australia”.

“Heave away your caravan, heave away, haul away Watch for the cop with the radar gun, bound for Mallacoota”

“Bound for Mallacoota” was not the first song I’ve written that was inspired by our family’s favoured holiday location. That honour belongs to one I wrote in the late 1990s, “Mallacoota Time”. It begins with....

“Lazy breeze at my window, I’m looking out on a picture”.

Situated on the far east coast of Victoria, the small township of Mallacoota is surrounded by natural splendour, a tiny oasis of civilisation in the middle of a vast wilderness, Croajingalong National Park. It’s a popular destination for adventurers, bush walkers and nature lovers where you can paddle on its tranquil waters, share a bush track with a lyrebird or stroll along pristine beaches while sea eagles soar above.

“Aah, and if you want to taste that salty air.

Ooh, and any road can take you there.”

On arriving in the town you would think its short main street, with its two supermarkets, butchers, bank, post office, pub, chemist and cafes

could be anywhere. But if you continue to the bottom of Maurice Avenue, turn left and venture just a few hundred metres further down to the wharf, you are greeted with a view of breathtaking beauty. A vast glistening lake extends to a tree fringed horizon while squadrons of seabirds gather on the nearby sandbars. It’s so peaceful.

“It’s the end of the day and I’m straying away from my mind. Mmm Mallacoota time”

Imagine falling asleep to the sound of the ocean and waking every morning to bird song. Clear night skies with stars so bright you don’t need a light. Silent dawns where sea and sky merge into silver mist. Sun dappled forest glades so magical you think you’ve stepped into a scene from The Hobbit.

“Mallacoota Time” sat on the shelf until 2001 when it was used in a primary school music program I was writing with a couple of mates. Recorded with marimba, maracas and claves, Hawaiian guitar and bass plus ocean and seagull sound effects it reflected the laid back, relaxed feel of that little coastal town. Like “The Dock of the Bay” with ukuleles.

But it was never a part of my live repertoire. Until January this year, when I sang it in the town that inspired it, at the open mic session at Lucy’s Restaurant. Apart from a drunken karaoke performance of “Brown Eyed Girl” at The Tides Restaurant I’d never performed in Mallacoota. My short set was well received and later in the afternoon I was enjoying a beer when a local musician approached me. Her name was Lisa and she told me that she had been the music teacher at the local P-12 school. “I just wanted to tell you how much my students enjoyed singing “Mallacoota Time””, she said. “I also taught it with ukuleles during lock down. Thank you for writing it.” And thank you Mallacoota for inspiring it.

Will I write another song about Mallacoota? As long as we keep returning, there’s every chance.



## MORE BUSH KINDER PLACES TO GROW LITTLE LEARNERS

Hundreds more Victorian children will soon be given the chance to learn, explore and play in nature, with the State Government expanding the highly popular Bush Kinder program.

The State Government is investing \$3.6 million to expand Bush Kinder programs in up to 600 kindergarten services. Since the grants started, 300 services have already received funding to establish or improve their programs. Minister for Children Lizzie Blandthorn and Member for Monbulk Daniela De Martino announced that another 150 kindergartens will now run Bush Kinder, supported by more than \$900,000 (\$6000 per applicant) in funding to make outdoor early learning accessible right across Victoria.

The 2026 expansion will see new Bush Kinder programs established in 55 local government areas, including 30 regional communities – giving

more children the chance to learn in nature close to home. This includes Gembrook Preschool and Kallista Kindergarten in the

Monbulk District. Several Kindergartens in Boronia, The Basin, and surrounding areas have received funding for Bush kinders programs since 2023. These are: Little Charlie's Early Learning Centre Ferntree Gully, Goodstart Early Learning Boronia, Bayswater Childcare & Kinder, and Arrabri Kindergarten Inc, Bayswater North.

Bush Kinder programs are educational sessions that take learning beyond the classroom and into parks, bushland and beaches, where children can climb, explore and discover the natural world – building confidence, curiosity and a love of the outdoors. These natural spaces can include: metropolitan parks, regional parks, local bushland local beaches, visitor sites within national and state parks. Children get to learn through play with natural materials outside. It's like a fun classroom in nature. These supervised programs

give children safe opportunities to learn through play, supporting their physical and cognitive development while encouraging independence and problem-solving.

Experts in children's learning say outdoor play is important for children's learning and wellbeing. It helps children grow physically and mentally and helps them learn how to handle risks. This approach lines up with the Victorian Early Years Learning and Development Framework (VEYLDF) and the National Quality Framework (NQF)

Member for Monbulk Daniela De Martino said "I am delighted that Gembrook Preschool and Kallista Kindergarten have secured Bush Kinder funding. These programs give children the opportunity to learn, explore, and build confidence through connection with the natural environment that is such a special part of our hills communities."

## FUNDING BOOST FOR INDEPENDENT SCHOOLS

The State Government is ensuring every Victorian student has access to the best facilities by helping low-fee independent schools with funding to modernise classrooms and build new infrastructure.

State Member for Monbulk, Daniela De Martino, announced that Ghilgai School in Kilsyth is one of nine successful recipients of the latest round of funding for independent schools across regional and metropolitan Victoria. The nine independent schools will share \$26.2 million to expand and modernise existing facilities or build new schools.

Ghilgai School will receive \$1,150,000 to upgrade and refurbish the main entrance and reception area, staff facilities, learning enrichment areas, student amenities and outdoor multi-use spaces. This is just one of the projects being delivered through the Labor Government's \$450 million Building Fund for Non-Government Schools,

which helps schools upgrade and expand their facilities, ensuring families have the best learning environments for their children.

The State Government also opened the fourth and final round of the Building Fund for Non-Government Schools, Independent Schools, with applications closing in February 2026. The previous round of this funding provided \$40 million for works at thirteen independent schools.

To date, thirty-one independent schools have received \$84.4 million from the fund. Close to \$18.5 billion has been invested to build new schools across all sectors and deliver more than 2,300 school upgrades, supporting more than 30,000 jobs in construction and associated industries.

## Thanks to our Early Learning Educators

Last week, I was at home with my toddler when an alert came through on my phone from his childcare centre. When I checked, I found an announcement to all parents stating that the centre was being evacuated. The centre was Goodstart Early Learning Bayswater North, opposite Colchester Road Nursery, which had caught fire.

It has been amazing to see the community support the nursery following the fire that burnt down the building. This is one of the things I think Australia does well, the way the community rallies around people after a misfortune. The posts about the nursery fire on the BBCN Facebook page have had a lot of comments and interactions. Many people have promised (and been) down to the nursery to buy some plants and support the business. The emergency services have been thanked and praised for their hard work. The view of this experience for me was slightly different, coming through the connection with the childcare care.

I was so impressed that, amongst the huge task of evacuating babies, toddlers, 3 and 4-year-olds, and keeping them calm, they were still able to contact parents. Updates were sent about how children were coping. And there were instructions on how to collect your kids from the park where they were waiting and distracting the children.

It made me think about what I was trusting these educators to do. When we booked our little one into care, I was looking for a few things. People who would teach my child good life and social skills. Educators who were patient, kind and knowledgeable. I expected people to be up-to-date on first aid processes, child development and allergies. But I didn't think about the skills needed to keep my child feeling secure when life throws a curveball.

So thank you to the team at Goodstart Early Learning Bayswater North, for what





you did for the kids that day and everyday. And to childhood educators in general, I am, once again, in awe of all you do.

## Mayor's Message March

Advocating for Knox



Hello neighbours! This month, I want to share an update for The Basin.

The Basin Parking Management Plan was supported by Council in January. The plan is based on two rounds of community consultation and an independent parking report, which have come together to make a plan for parking in The Basin. Thank you for all the feedback from locals.

What did you tell us? The main issues were bike parking is a problem, more car parking spaces are required, need for a safe U-turn space on Mountain Highway, safety on the roads around the shops, and time-limited parking.

A few points of interest for us:

Mountain Highway – this area has lots of use, bike riders, cars and pedestrians, surrounded by shops, homes and parkland. Mountain Highway is a Department of Transport Road, so Council will be speaking to the Department to have the road reviewed for safety improvements.

Bicycle Parking/Usage – as locals, we know the area is popular for bike riders. Council will be implementing more bicycle parking, with better placement.

Increased parking – our residents can see that creating additional parking in The Basin is challenging. The Plan recommends creating additional curbside parking along Church Street, checking in with street residents prior to any actions taken.

Accessible parking – coincidentally, the Knox Mobility Access Action Plan was also supported by Council in December. Community input from this plan showed that increased accessible parking was wanted, and well-located, so there will be an additional accessible car park will be added to The Basin shops.

Parking limits – feedback noted cars overstaying in key car parks, and longer-term car parks should be further away, so parking signage will be fixed up. There are also cars parking in unsafe/illegal locations, such as directly in front of the roundabout, so signage in these spots will be added.

The Basin Parking Management Plan will be implemented over the next 12 months.

Also, shout out to The Basin Music Festival Committee and the great amount of work that's happening to pull the festival together! Look forward to seeing you all over the weekend 20, 21 and 22 March!

## Spike in reports of scammers impersonating Qantas to steal your personal information and money.



### What's happening?

Scammers are impersonating Qantas in emails and text messages to steal your personal information and money. They create a sense of urgency to try and get you to act quickly without checking first. Scammers will use Qantas logos and branding to make the communication look real. The email or text

message will urge you to click a link to either:

- \* claim a refund
- \* claim a gift
- \* redeem points that are about to expire.

If you click this link you will be directed to a scam website designed to steal any information you enter. Qantas has been warning of these sorts of scams, which were first identified in August 2025, and encourages customers to be alert to continued scam activity. The airline does not contact customers to ask for their PINs, passwords, or one-time passwords in text messages or email.



More information can be found on Qantas.com dedicated scams page. The NASC and Qantas work collaboratively to share scam intelligence and to disrupt scams.

### Who's at risk

Anyone could be targeted by this scam. You do not need to be an existing Qantas customer or Qantas Frequent Flyer. However, people who know or suspect they have been involved in a data breach may be at greater risk of being targeted.

## Pet's Piece: Are corn cobs dangerous for your pet

When one of your own pets becomes your patient, the emotional weight is completely different. The clinical mind is still there, but the heart is louder.

Last weekend, one of my very own dogs became suddenly unwell. By midday, he was vomiting and brought up a piece of corn cob, something we hadn't seen before. We elected to monitor him closely over the next few hours, but he remained flat. The biggest red flag for him was that he didn't want his dinner.

Meet Hector, our almost 4-year-old Golden Retriever. He does have a history of eating unusual things, and because of that, we are usually very careful. As Hector deteriorated, I performed a thorough physical examination at home. On abdominal palpation, I could feel something abnormal. Normally, faeces in the large intestine are compressible and non-painful. This felt different; it felt firm, fixed, and uncomfortable.

An abdominal ultrasound confirmed my concern. I could see a structure casting a distinct acoustic shadow within the small intestine. While an ultrasound cannot tell us exactly what the object is, it gives important clues. The small intestine should primarily contain fluid and ingesta, not a solid object creating shadowing. Shadowing can be normal in the large intestine, where faeces form, but not in the small intestine. This made me quite worried, and was highly suspicious of a foreign body obstruction. The decision was made to take him to surgery.

Discovering that he would need surgery was incredibly stressful as I did not want to operate on my own dog. Within 10 minutes, an incredible team of support arrived at the clinic once I made some frantic phone calls to my colleagues. On one of the most stressful days of my career, I was reminded how lucky I am to be surrounded

by such an amazing community. In surgery, the obstruction was found lodged firmly in the intestines. After making an incision over it and removing it, we found a CORN COB!

We were still not completely out of the woods. Post-operative complications, particularly leakage or breakdown of intestinal sutures, are most likely within the first 3–5 days. Thankfully, Hector is now 10 days post-surgery and tracking well.

Corn cobs are, surprisingly, one of the most common foreign body obstructions we see in dogs. They smell like food, dogs love them, and many people believe they are harmless to chew. Dogs retrieve them from parks, compost bins, rubbish bags, and picnic areas. They are incredibly dangerous. Corn cobs do not digest. They cause complete intestinal obstruction and can quickly become life-threatening emergencies requiring major abdominal surgery.

If sharing Hector's story prevents even one dog from going through this, it's worth it. If you're having a picnic, walking through a park, or see someone offering their dog a corn cob, please remember this story.

Experiences like this shift your perspective. Going from veterinarian to client is humbling. It deepens the empathy I feel for my own clients because now I truly understand the stress, the fear, and the waiting. This isn't the first time I have had to be a client with my own pets, but it is a true reminder that we can never take them for granted. After all of that, Hector has taught me something too.

## A Bird Tour with Des Palmer

Arthur and I have never been ones for bird watching, but we do love spending time in bush scenery. We thought, as bird watching is so popular, we would go on a morning bird tour with Des Palmer from Australian Bird Tours. We chose to go to Wicks' reserve in The Basin as it is close to home. However, Des does tours in many different locations. It was a pleasant morning out, and as we strolled along, Des began pointing out different birds. "Look - there, he would say that's a Spotted Pardalote," for example. There were common birds, which we recognised, such as the Crimson Rosella and the Noisy Miner, and many others which we did not. He was constantly pointing out birds that we had not even noticed. Some were in trees, others in the scrub or on logs and others we saw flying overhead. We asked him how he knew so quickly where to see the birds. He said that he hears their calls, and it depended on where the sound was coming from as to where they were most likely to be. He was full of information about all the birds we saw. Des was also able to name most of the trees we saw and was able to tell us which ones were native to the area and which ones had been introduced. All up, we saw 22 species of birds in only two hours. We thought that 22 birds were a lot, but Des did point out that if you want to see even more birds, you have to start a lot earlier than 10 am. Overall, we thoroughly enjoyed our first bird watching experience.

The list of birds we saw: Eastern Yellow Robin, Rainbow Lorikeet, Spotted Pardalote, Crimson Rosella, Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoo, Kookaburra, Lewin's Honeyeater, Yellow-faced Honeyeater, Black-faced Cuckoo-Shrike, Brown Thornbill, Sulphur-crested Cockatoo, Eastern Whipbird, Superb-fairy Wren, Noisy Miner, White-throated Treecreeper, Grey Fantail, King Parrot, Australian Magpie.

## Kids Dental Care

### Signs You Might Be Grinding Your Teeth (and What to Do About It) Boronia Dental Team

Ever wake up with a sore jaw or headache and wonder why? You might be grinding your teeth — also known as bruxism. Many people don't even realise they're doing it, especially since it often happens at night. Over time, though, grinding can cause serious problems for your teeth, jaw and overall oral health.

#### Common signs of teeth grinding

- Jaw pain or tightness, especially in the morning
- Headaches that start near the temples
- Worn, chipped, or flattened teeth
- Increased tooth sensitivity
- Clicking or popping sounds in the jaw
- Trouble sleeping (or complaints from a partner about grinding noises at night)

#### Why it happens

Teeth grinding is often linked to stress, anxiety, or sleep issues. It can also be related to bite alignment problems or lifestyle factors like too much caffeine or alcohol. Kids sometimes grind their teeth too, but usually many outgrow it.

#### Why it's a problem

Occasional grinding may not do much harm, but frequent grinding can wear down enamel, damage fillings or crowns, and even cause cracks in teeth. Over time, it can also lead to TMJ (temporomandibular joint) disorders, which affect how your jaw moves.

#### What you can do

- Reduce stress: Relaxation techniques, exercise, and good sleep habits can help.
- Limit triggers: Cut back on caffeine and alcohol, especially in the evening.
- Protect your teeth: we recommend wearing a custom night guard to prevent damage while you sleep.
- Check with your dentist: If you notice signs of grinding, book in for a dental consult.

**Final Tip:** Pay attention to the warning signs. Catching teeth grinding early can save your smile (and your jaw) from unnecessary damage. A quick chat with your dentist could make all the difference.

## BBCN Vice President John Edgley Why I volunteer.

John Edgley, our Vice president, has lived in Boronia with his wife Anne for 48 years.

John and Anne were married in 1969 and moved to Boronia from Thornbury in 1975 with their young family. Their children grew up in Boronia and attended Boronia Heights Primary School. We recently sat down with him to find out why he started volunteering and what it means to him.

John ran a Warehouse and Distribution logistics business, Complete Transport Pty Ltd, based in Dandenong until he retired. During this time, he supported the Mental Illness Fellowship Foundation based in Heidelberg. Volunteers from the foundation would catch the train from Heidelberg to Dandenong. John would take them to and from the station to his workplace and provide them with work experience.

John was always community-minded and in the 1970-80's became involved with Steve Crabbs' Knox price action group. They went from supermarket to supermarket comparing prices to ensure a level playing field, sometimes being thrown out of the stores for their troubles.

In 2014, John answered a call from the BBCN paper for an advertising manager. Learning the



ropes from Keith Cree, he quickly made the role his own. In 2018, Keith Cree retired as President, and John felt it was time for a change for direction. He persuaded John Pernu into the presidency and became the vice president. "Together we made a good team" he said. They spent many hours reconnecting to the local community and also the wider newspaper community

of CNAV. He credits this reconnection as his greatest achievement with the paper and is glad that he has met so many wonderful community people over the years. After the passing of John Pernu he again set out to find a new president, asking Patrick Kelly, "Would you like to be President? Another great duo has begun.

We asked him if there were any funny stories from his time at the paper. He said yes, but none that he was able to share.

And his thoughts on the future of our paper? He said that the future is bright because we now have some younger people volunteering to help. People in the community are continuing to read the paper and their interest in local issues is growing.

## Radio Eastern FM 98.1 Volunteering opportunities

Radio Eastern FM was formed in 1974. The station transmitted test broadcasts until a licence was granted in late 1990. Full-time broadcasts began on 23 February, 1991.

## The Boronia Mall light sculpture.

You may have seen pictures of the Boronia Mall in its opening days; these photos featured almost exclusively a large eye-catching sculpture hanging from the ceiling above the stage in the foyer of the centre.

The sculpture doubled as a chandelier of sorts. It dropped a full six metres from the roof with three concentric rings at its peak, the widest having a three metre diameter. Suspended from these rings hung 9,000 125 mm. mauve, amber & pink plastic discs. The sculpture was not a light fixture but a means to diffuse the banks of twenty mercury vapour lights, which gave the centre its bright, airy atmosphere.

You can still see the area and the rails and fixtures from which it once hung.

The idea of the installation was conceived and designed by the centre architects Buchan, Laird & Buchan, while the builders T.H. Lustig and Mercator Lighting designed, constructed, and installed the piece. Mercator, back then, was an emerging entity specialising in budget light fittings like oyster lights and baton fixes, usually made of Perspex and pressed aluminium, that were in huge demand during the popularity of the building of apartments and flats in the 1960's & 70's.

The Managing Director of Mercator, Syd Kleerkoper, boasted it was the first and largest light sculpture of its kind in Australia. And who was to argue? It was an impressive piece that was a stylish drawcard for the centre.

Now things get a bit murky. In 1986, the centre went through a major refurbishment. Staircases were removed from the car park and the Chandler Road ends. The carpark entrance stairs were replaced with a single escalator, while the Chandler Road end stairs were removed, including the rockery underneath to create more floor space. The walkway leading to Kmart at the same end also had the bottom half of the tile work covered with plaster and railing (perhaps even removed, no one is sure)

But somewhere in these upgrades, the light structure "disappeared."

While no one I've talked to has a collaborative story to confirm the truth, the most accepted story is that a tip truck backed into the Mall one morning, and the whole sculpture was dropped, complete with all parts still connected into the truck's tray and driven away. The reason?

Once again, the most commonly accepted reason seems to be to escape from garish 1970's chic. Which, when looking at the old photos, it had in spades. The design and look of the installation had a very dated appearance, and being the mid-1980's, the times and fashions were changing fast. It also meant events that were held in the staging area could be seen unobstructed from the upper levels. Opening up



the viewing area, thus capacity for special occasions.

Pictures are rare from anytime before or after the refurbishments, though there are plenty after the Mall was sold in 1988, showcasing the crowds watching events on the then-rotating stage.

Whether the sculpture would have stood the test of time is debatable. The colourful discs were Perspex and were subject to becoming brittle with age; they were also notorious for collecting dust. The maintenance would become a problem over time. It's ironic these days that the sculpture may have been removed to stop the centre from becoming dated, and it never seems to be a part of the Mall that people bring up when reminiscing about their past visits there. It is a shame that some of the coloured discs weren't saved for old times' sake, but progress is progress to some.

We also must remember it has been gone for nearly forty years. I look at old pictures from the centre from the 1970s and don't so much wonder if it would still be an iconic part of the Mall; I want to know if it made chiming or rustling sounds when a breeze or object hit it.


